


Whilst the new restricted hours at the hospital's accident and emergency are not ideal, it's probably not the time to panic.

During the war the slogan was 'be alert but not alarmed', and we could probably apply it here. It seems that we have at least retained accident and emergency services - just not any requiring an on-call situation. This doesn't help some locals who do have some serious and ongoing health issues, but unless we can attract some long term, committed health professionals, this is what we have to live with.

Continuing to support our clinic and hospital, as well as other services ensures our town continues to thrive - we have just passed the 1,000 mark, something that quite a few of us thought we'd never reach, and that's a good thing. Steady growth augurs well for our future, and indicates to people who are contemplating a move, that Mt Pleasant is a beautiful rural community with all the essential services either here, or very close by, and is a viable option.

The solution the doctors, hospital and SA Health have come up with is the best we could hope for, all things considered, and it's good that the conversation regarding the recruitment system for country doctors has been brought to the public's attention - again. Paula can recall having a long interview with former Mt Pleasant doctor Bob Cotton on this issue over a decade ago.

Mount Pleasant has had the services of a stable and professional clinic service for decades, compared to a lot of other areas in Australia, which haven't been as lucky.



Kristy & Allan Loechel, together with their children Bradley, Aaliyah and newborn Charlie are hoping that the reduced service won't come at a high personal cost.

MOUNT PLEASANT ACCIDENT AND EMERGENCY HOURS CHANGE

Mount Pleasant residents will soon receive after-hours emergency care from hospitals in surrounding areas due to a reduction in the number of doctors available to provide on-call services at Mount Pleasant District Hospital.

Country Health SA (CHSA) Regional Director of Nursing and Midwifery, Wendy Harvey, said the new hours will come into operation from 4 March 2019

"Due to a shortage of GPs at Talunga Clinic, the Mount Pleasant District Hospital will no longer have on-call emergency services available 24 hours per day," Ms Harvey said

"The Accident and Emergency Service (AE) will have on-call doctors available between 8am and 6pm seven days a week and anyone requiring medical assistance out of these hours should call 000.

"Last year, a total of 820 people presented to the Mount Pleasant AE and less than a third of these presentations were overnight, amounting to an average of four presentations per week.

"Of those 820 total presentations, only two people had conditions that were considered life threatening and just 40 patients needed urgent care.

"While we recognise this will be a change for the community, there are four hospitals that provide 24/7 emergency services within 30 minutes of Mount Pleasant District Hospital including Gumeracha, Mannum, Angaston and Gawler hospitals

CHSA Acting Deputy Chief Executive Officer of Barossa Hills and Fleurieu. Debbie Martin, said the Talunga Clinic is privately owned and recruits their own staff

"Across the state, GPs are contracted to provide medical services to our local hospitals and while the circumstances changed for the local GPs, we continue strive to provide high-quality acute care for the community," Ms Martin said.

Talunga Clinic General Practitioner, Dr Bryan Goh, said while the clinic made every effort to recruit high-quality doctors to the service, ultimately an alternative model of safe care was necessary to implement.

"We are committed to providing excellent and sustainable healthcare services to the community and the difficult decision had to be made in order to prioritise patient safety." Dr Goh said.

Any residents of Mount Pleasant that require medical assistance should call 000 immediately, where an ambulance will transport them to the most appropriate hospital.

Our History Hero



Last year we celebrated 175 years of settlement in Mount Pleasant – quite the achievement for a small town in South Australia, especially as so many small towns are struggling for survival. Against all the odds, Mount Pleasant's population has actually grown, and we have hit the 1,000 mark. Despite all the cutbacks to

services, our community is thriving and will continue to grow as long as we have faith and display that wonderful can-do attitude that our forebears did.

Paula Bartsch is our town Historian. When the History Room was established in the old Library in the hall in 2004, Paula was there to oversee the safe storage and curation of the wealth of information donated by local people and organisations – but little did she know that she'd be the <u>only</u> one for a very long time. Over the years she has been joined by a handful of people who have helped and supported her in one way or another, but the bulk of the responsibility has always fallen to Paula.

In 2017 she had an idea to celebrate the 175th year of settlement, but was loathe to organise a single event, as she was involved in so many other things. We knew that wouldn't last.

Community organisations were approached and were happy to acknowledge the milestone during their events, but she thought there was still room for something more.

Paula started the year by again helping to organise the Australia Day breakfast – as well as gathering the nominations to award community honours, and then taking on the role of MC.

The Red Cross Garden Party was in February, and in March Paula took over as convener in the Art section for the MP Show – and although not strictly a 175 event, it added to an already full workload.

In April we saw the Police Station event, then Anzac Day for which Paula researched and mounted a display.

May is History month, and by it's very nature

it's a big series of events for any historian or

group, and apart from mounting a display in the hall, Paula arranged a tour of cemeteries, which included a lunch at Mannum.

In June she organised another successful Violet Day -



continuing the marvelous tradition started by Alexandrine Seager, all those years ago.

July brought the Time Capsule launch in the market, which again included a lot of research and collation. Unfortunately the Historic Walk had to be postponed to October because of the terrible weather.

In August Paula took some time off with Bill to take a short holiday, and then it was back to business, organising the Quiz Night for the beginning of September.

Two weeks after that, we held the 'Cocktails and Carriages' event to commemorate the 100 years of rail coming to Mt Pleasant.

As the weather was much kinder by October, the rescheduled History Walk took us around important and significant sites in Mt Pleasant, with commentary from people who remembered times long gone, it was a great learning experience.

During November Paula finished collating the '175 Recipes' book, and sent it to the printers so it would be ready for release at the Street Party. The rest of November was putting the final touches to the Street Party, which took place on the first of December. Despite again experiencing rain – it was a great event and we'll be back this year.

This doesn't cover all that Paula was involved in. There were also quite a few history workshops, and meetings she chaired as head of the Barossa Regional Heritage Network, not to mention helping with the Men's Shed and other groups. Despite all of

the work she did last year, she still managed to finish the year with a smile – although she is intending to stick to her vow of keeping

things simple this year! Thank you. Paula. you

remind us all that it's never too late to make your mark – and people who say they don't have time to help don't know what they're talking about!






Pete's Poem
