Council matters

As someone who is relatively new to Local Government I am often asked if I am enjoying my work as a Councillor. The short answer is, yes. Since November of last year I have been on a steep learning curve however Mayor Bim Lange, fellow Councillors, the CEO Martin McCarthy and his staff have been a tremendous help as I try to assist and advocate for people across the Barossa but in particular the south eastern corner.

When I first took this job on there were, and still are issues with the watering of the Mount Pleasant Oval. With others I have worked to ensure that the Mount Pleasant Oval has an assured and cost effective supply of water. To that end \$211,000 has been allocated in the budget this

financial year for the irrigation of the Mount Pleasant Oval using recycled water.

Recently Council conducted an audit of tennis and netball courts. That audit revealed that the Pleasant Mount courts were in need of work to the value \$700,000.00. Last financial year \$40.000 allocated undertake work on courts. remained unspent and was rolled over into this financial

year. I am pleased to let people that there has been a quarter one adjustment in the 2019/2020 budget and a further \$210,000.00 has been added to the \$40,000 for an all up total of \$250,000 for work upon the tennis and netball courts. This allocation is subject to matched grant funding. If successful in grant funding it will result in a half million dollar upgrade to the tennis and netball courts. I have my fingers and toes crossed for the tennis and netball players of the district that we can obtain grant funding to bring most of the courts up to an acceptable standard. I can't thank Council enough, in particular Jo Thomas and her staff for the work they have done with this project. Whilst we are close to having the courts upgraded we are not quite across the line. I will keep people informed as soon as I hear anything about grant applications.

People will see elsewhere in The Beat that Old Talunga Park is to celebrate its Centenary later this month. What better way to celebrate than with a new footbridge across the River Torrens. Thank you to Matt Elding and his staff for delivering a new footbridge, I just hope it leads to new and improved tennis and netball courts. Living locally I have heard all sorts of figures bandied about regarding the cost of this project, whilst the final amount has not been finalised, I can let everyone know that just short of \$120,000 was allocated to the project. Hopefully the project comes in under this figure so money can be spent elsewhere within Council.

The last item I touch upon is the cost of energy (power) to run a facility such as Talunga Park. The cost has not gone unnoticed. To that end our local incorporated body tasked with the job of managing Talunga Park and the SMH have been looking at ways to reduce costs. To that end Council has again come to the fore and allocated up to \$20,000 to undertake a feasibility study examining the viability of alternative power supplies to Talunga Park. I await the outcome of that study. Until next time, regards to all.

Bill Broughton's excellent adventure



William Russell Broughton (Bill) was born on August 16, 1946 in Los Angeles, USA, to Salvation Army officer parents, Harold and Ruth Broughton. This family background had far-reaching implications on his path in life; constant moving to new communities and new schools developed Bill's outgoing personality and ability to make new friends readily, and the exposure to brass band music gave him an early sense of his destiny.

When he was ten years of age, he heard the International Staff Band of the Salvation Army who were touring the USA and was inspired by the playing of the featured trombone soloist John Cobb. He announced to his father, 'Get me a trombone!' With this request, his father went out and bought him a third hand trombone and an Arban's Tutor and armed with these two acquisitions Bill began to teach himself to play. From this humble beginning Bill went on to carve out a brilliant career in professional music, within the avenues of performance, recording, composing, arranging, conducting, producing, teaching and motivating.

In 1968 at the age of 22, Bill went to Hollywood to begin his career as a studio musician and was soon playing for

most of the television and motion picture studios. Some of the television shows were Bonanza, Gunsmoke, Little House on the Prairie and Kojak, while the list of movies included Jaws 2, The Godfather 2, Honey I Blew Up the Kids, and Miracle on 34th Street and more. As a player Bill performed for many artists, from Sinatra to Streisand, but also enjoyed tenure with The Roger Wagner Chorale and Symphonia Orchestra, The New York Ballet, San Francisco Ballet and many others. It was there he came to the attention of the top composers and conductors like David Rose, Lalo Schifrin, Morton Stevens and Carmen Dragon among others. In the mid 1970s Bill moved into the next phase of his career. Composing for shows like *Quincy M.E., Hawaii 5-0*, The Tonight Show and Buck Rogers, he soon accumulated an impressive resume of nearly 1000 musical scores for television shows and had several symphonic and other commissioned compositions premiered as well.

In the early 1980s Bill became executive director for a new production for *Bullwinkle Inc.* Using the original talent of the cartoon characters of the series *The Adventures of Rocky and Bullwinkle and Friends,* Bill left his episodic writing to use his people and management skills to produce over 120 scripts, songs and musical productions of all styles for the company.

In 1991 Bill was the composer/music director of the international Miss World competition in Atlanta, Georgia, and in 1994, Intersound International produced eight albums entitled *The Magic of the Movies*, with Bill as artist and conductor, and these albums were released nationally in the USA. 1994 also marked the release of two Jazz albums featuring ten trombones and rhythm, with Bill featuring as arranger as well as performer. Billboard Magazine gave these albums *Spiritual to the Bone 1 and 2* a great review and they were released to international acclaim.

In 1996 he was appointed the Music Director of the 1996 Atlanta Paralympics games. His responsibilities included writing original music and overseeing and conducting all music productions for the event, working with such artists as Aretha Franklin and Liza Minelli.

In a lifelong musical career, which spanned the worlds of orchestral, jazz and popular music, Bill never forgot his early interest in the world of brass band music, and invested a portion of his immense talent into compositions and arrangements for brass bands, as well as into adjudicating of brass band contests. His music for these groups has been played and recorded internationally for many years and his works have been used for contests and National Band Championships in Australia, New Zealand and Britain. In June 2011 Bill had two of his arrangements performed at the Royal Albert Hall during the 120th anniversary of the Salvation Army. At the time of his death, Bill had been the president of the National Band Council of Australia for three years.

Following a national tour of Australia with the trombone group *Spiritual to the Bone,* Bill moved to South Australia in 2003. He gained permanent residency and in 2006 became an Australian citizen.

Bill was a larger than life figure with a warm and effervescent personality, and he readily made friends in his adopted country. It was at this time that he met his wife Jan; a romance blossomed, and they were married in February 2005. Bill had adult children in America, but since Jan had been widowed some years previously, her four children now gained a stepfather who entered into their family life with his customary warmth and enthusiasm.

They eventually purchased the delightful country property 'Glenroy Homestead' on the edge of the eastern Adelaide Hills and settle down to a more relaxed lifestyle, becoming involved in the Mount Pleasant community. Bill was able to maintain his worldwide contacts in the musical world with an extensive online network, which included composing and arranging commissions across the various genres of orchestra, concert band, brass band, big band and other groups.

With Jan at his side they often travelled for Bill's musical commitments, such as performing on trombone, adjudicating at band contests and giving presentations as a motivational speaker.

He wrote and published two motivational books. He had been part of the Generations in Jazz weekend in Mount Gambier with James Morrison since 2006 and relished the opportunity to assist and encourage young performers; he was also a part time lecturer at the Elder Conservatorium of Music at the Adelaide University from 2003 to 2007.

Until recently, Bill was still producing his own solo trombone CDs, and travelling interstate to lecture, conduct and perform as a soloist. He produced a sound on trombone, which was unique, 'like golden honey in tone'. He continued to be much sought after as an adjudicator for brass band competitions, and also as an inspirational motivational presenter. At the 2017 Generations in Jazz he gave this valuable advice to students:

'You play to give your gift away. A listener comes because they don't do what you do; you complete them by playing and they complete you by listening.'

'Music is an art of the heart, not an art of the intellect. Always give your best because that's all that's required. If you had fun, that's even better. Make sure it's always fun, that's why we play.'

After more than fifty years of a career that covered a broad spectrum of the music world, Bill's family and friends were saddened by the onset of a congenital condition, which diminished his capabilities and cut his life short. Throughout this difficult time, he was nursed at home by Jan. He is survived by his devoted wife Jan, his three

children Krissy,

When the end came, he was, to use an old Salvation Army term, 'Promoted to Glory' from the Mount Pleasant Hospital on June 29, 2019.

Pleasant History

Rex Amber's Legacy



The bridge behind the Hall has been replaced and I am assured that the memorials that were placed in front of the bridge in 1989 will be reinstated. This pedestrian bridge (which if you care to take a look, is at the moment an invitation to something else) was named the 'Rex Amber Walkway' in honour of Rex Amber, a former Councillor in the Mount Pleasant District Council from 1980 to 1986, and someone who gave a lot to his community. Rex had been a farmer in the Birdwood region throughout his working life, and on his retirement he and his wife Kath, an awesome teddy bear maker, retired to a house in Melrose Street, Mount Pleasant. They gave back to the community. Rex pottered at the new Talunga Park, creating the stone ticket boxes which are rarely used as such these days, but were constructed as shelter for those selling tickets to the regular football games, which occurred in those days. Rex had an artistic eye and would collect various logs and wait until they spoke to him of what they could become. Hence we have the wooden animals at Talunga Park... at least they are still hanging in there currently, but without some loving care they will soon disintegrate.



Pictured above is the crayfish, and right is a close-up of its face. You can see that it once possessed a cheeky grin, but there's not much to smile about now.

My grandchildren will be some of the many children who have played on these structures and will miss them should they disappear.

Rex had a vision, which included the beautification of the township, and it is due to him that the trees and shrubs were planted on the then St Magnus (now Magnus Australia) grounds, to beautify the roadside in front of these buildings.

In 1983 he and Wally Kubank created a new garden area, which included a former PMG pole as a flagpole. A flag provided by the Mount Pleasant District Council was flown at half-mast on February 18th and 19th 1983, in tribute to those who suffered in the Ash Wednesday bushfires. During the 1988 Mount Pleasant Show Kath Amber and Brian Pym unveiled a plaque in this garden, in appreciation of the work that had been carried out by Rex throughout the community, but particularly at the Show where he had assisted, and had been Patron. This ceremony had been planned as a surprise for Rex, but he died a short time prior, so his wife received the recognition on his behalf. John and Jackie McAuliffe, then owners of St Magnus, donated the Rex Amber Memorial Trophy to the Show Society, to be awarded to the Best Presented and Neatest Trade Exhibit, in his honour.

The other memorial plaque in front of the bridge told the story of why the bridge was in place. It is hoped that we can expand on this and create a storyboard with some pictures of the former bridge and the history of the area generally, to encourage visitors (and locals) to appreciate the thought that was given by and to the community 100 years ago. Most importantly we should recognise those community members who gave so much to us. Without Robert T. Melrose we would not have had Talunga Park or the trees in our main street and beyond, and without the dedicated hours of work by Rex Amber, the beautiful park we enjoy today would still be a dream. Both men gave unselfishly to the township they loved.



The Centre of Democracy and the History Trust of South Australia is marking 125 years of women's suffrage in the State by coordinating a series of programs and events throughout South Australia during 2019. In December 1894, after decades of activism, women in South Australia were awarded the right to vote and stand for parliament. In 2019 we celebrate the victory of the early suffragists such as Mary Lee, Augusta Zadow, Catherine Helen Spence and those who joined the fight. The Suffrage 125 initiative explores issues of gender equality over the past 125 years. Catherine Helen Spence was Australia's first professional female journalist and first female political candidate to stand for election. She was a dedicated social and political reformer. Spence's influence on the suffrage movement culminated in South Australia being the first Australian colony where women won the right to vote, and the first in the world to give women the right to stand for Parliament. Spence stood for election in the 1897 Federal Convention, but was unsuccessful. A woman was not elected to State Parliament until 1959 when Joyce Steele and Jessie Cooper were elected.

White Lion

Whitelion's vision is for all young people to have equal opportunities to succeed.

Whitelion's purpose is to give young people the pride, courage and opportunities to change their lives.

Whitelion services are available in Sydney, Perth,

Adelaide, Mt Gambier, Melbourne, Frankston, Wyndham, Gippsland, and across Tasmania. Whitelion works in a trauma-informed and strengths-based model across five service streams:

- Prevention in schools
- Outreach and case management
- Mentoring
- Youth Programs
- Vocational pathways assistance, including alternative education settings and employment programs

Our Story - Origins

Whitelion was built on three founding assumptions in 1999:

 At risk young people have multiple services, professional workers, and often statutory orders, dictating the course of their lives.

Whitelion's response was to provide a pro-social adjunct to professional services - giving young people hope, encouragement and positive experiences that would support their engagement with services and focus on developing their connection to community beyond their diagnosis, history and service involvement.

 At risk young people have few stable, positive adult role models. Beyond their family networks, adults in their lives tend to be professional workers.

Whitelion recruited community volunteers to mentor young people – young people respond positively to the concept that unlike the professional workers they meet, volunteers weren't paid to be in their lives. This model allows us work with the concept of pro-social modelling to modify behaviour.

 At risk young people have no control over the childhood trauma or neglect that changes the way their brain functions in relation to decisionmaking and risk-taking. Those most at risk may be turned away from mainstream support services due to the intractability of their behaviour or complexity of their needs.

In its early days Whitelion picked up young people who were not suitable for mainstream youth support services, in the days before intensive case management was a mainstream practice. This drove Whitelion to develop trauma-informed practice models and to focus on strengths-based engagement.

Milestones

1999-2002, Melbourne

Whitelion was founded by Mark Watt AM and Glenn Manton. Mark was a manager at Parkville Youth Residential Centre and Glenn was a champion AFL player with a passion for inspiring at risk young people. Their shared experience and frustration at the lack of positive supports for young people in the justice system created the vision for Whitelion. Starting with pre and post-release programs for young people in custody, Whitelion initially delivered role model, mentoring and employment programs. A case management service to keep young Aboriginal people out of the justice system came next and our mentoring programs branched out into the Out of Home Care space to target a major risk gateway for young offenders. During these years a young man with lived experience of custody designed a youth leadership program, Young Lions.

2002-2011, taking the model across Australia

Whitelion took its innovative justice intervention programs from Victoria to Tasmania, South Australia and New South Wales.

2011-2016, adapting to a changing environment

The charities and non-profit sector changed rapidly following the global financial crisis and with the introduction of greater transparency with the establishment of the Australian Charities and Non-Profit Commission and greater sector focus on impact measurement. Mergers, for the purpose of creating sector efficiency became a governance focus. Whitelion merged with Open Family Australia in 2011, broadening Whitelion's services to include assertive street outreach to support homeless youth.


Additional mergers took place with Stride Foundation and Youth Connect, expanding Whitelion's services to prevention programs in schools. The merger Balga Detached Youth Work Project in Perth took Whitelion into the west for the first time.

2016 - 2018, looking to the future

Whitelion invested in social enterprise development to trial alternative funding streams and employment opportunities for youth. As we approached our 20 year anniversary, cofounder Mark Watt stepped into a development and ambassador role and Whitelion recruited a new Chief Executive Officer, Hang Vo, to lead Whitelion on a journey of renewal and growth.



In the morning, at rise of sun, They've learned I like to have a run, Round up the sheep, chase off the Roos, And race wherever I might choose.


A lap or two around the dam, Ah yes, I'm happy where I am. Back home for food, and rest my feet, Perhaps a snooze, if I feel beat.


