Are we the Barossa's problem child?

or art for art's sake I love the arts – or as Les Patterson so eloquently puts it "the yartz!" Big fan. Music, painting, sculpture, writing,

poetry - all of it. We can't live without it - even those who profess not to care about any of the above - need it. It feeds our souls. Without it our lives would be barren. Every culture reveres artistic endeavour in most forms. Then why would I think that establishing a Culture Hub at Tanunda now, would NOT be a good idea? On the face of it, it's a great concept, and I support repurposing old buildings and sympathetically adding to them. Locating similar activities in the same precinct, with shared facilities makes good, economic sense - just probably not at this time. After all, we still have \$7million owing on the Rex. Yep. I'll bet that surprised a few people. It sure surprised me, because even though I was aware that there were 'issues' and things had blown out in a couple of areas, I thought it would have been paid off by now, or at least, in the throes of. Apparently not. Also, Tanunda's Show Hall is also being considered for a major upgrade – good for them. It's a great facility and well used, BUT – so is Talunga Park. So why, after all the money spent on projects in Tanunda, would The Barossa Council now propose spending another \$10 million on a Culture Hub at Tanunda?

There are towns in the TBC area that are crying out for small sums, mostly maintenance expenditure, and TBC seems intent on putting the needs of the few ahead of the needs of a few. It's easy to ignore those places within the council boundaries, which contribute little to council coffers, and do next to nothing to promote brand 'Barossa', but should they be ignored? We all know what happens when necessary maintenance isn't carried out on our homes, it only gets worse and costs a lot more in the long run, so why should that be any different for town assets?

a community gym?

Following enquiries from the Beat, a local benefactor has kindly donated a huge, nearly new shed in which to establish a community gym. We are overwhelmed at this gesture, which also includes transporting it from it's current location, and some further assistance. With permission, I'll be adding more information in the future.

Although community interest has been promising, no-one has stepped forward to help get this project underway, and when I was almost ready to pass it on to another organisation in the hope it would run with it, Gareth made the observation that the Men's Shed needed a shed for metalwork and welding, so why not use it for both? The shed is pretty big, and can easily cope with several uses. Naturally it had to be taken to the Men's Shed committee for their approval, but it seems we are ready to conduct a feasibility study and start some initial planning.

I first started thinking about this as a project during our 'Fund My Neighbourhood' foray, the final stage of which was cancelled by the current government. Paula and I were keen to give the CWA memorial garden a do-over, which would include a rotunda. It was a last minute thing (although we were really pleased to garner a surprising number of votes), and then we saw that the Clinic had put up a proposal for a community gym. Not long after, Doctor Ellie visited the Men's Shed to have a chat about healthy living and exercise. Then on a driving trip I saw that the little town of Booleroo Centre had a community gym – and I thought - why not us? I made some enquiries with the bloke who ran the gym and found out that it wasn't as hard as I thought, although they had repurposed an old CFS shed, and we'd have to build our own - and find a place to put it! I've found some great contacts and also spoken to someone who is keen to be involved as she ran a gym interstate. A community gym is a great asset for any group - catering from birth to death. It could be a place to have kinder gym, yoga, pilates, boot camp, dancing, playing music, even stuff for us old fogeys! This will be a great project to become involved with, and the Men's Shed clearly know what they are doing - as anyone who has seen what they have done so far will attest, and I am indebted to the blokes for their offer to pursue this further.

Pleasant History

History of the History Room

The Mount Pleasant District Historical Research Group Inc. was placed into recess in the early 1990s when numbers dropped to 8 members. The money remaining in the account was donated to the Hall Committee for the purchase of a glass cabinet so that items held by the Hall committee could be put on display. The Committee purchased two such cabinets, which are now in the Memorial Entrance of the Mount Pleasant Soldiers' Memorial Hall.

Move on 20 years and with the material collected by Reg Butler whilst researching for the local history book... 'The Quiet Waters By'... a request was made to have this collection sorted, catalogued and preserved in the Library of the previous Institute at the Hall. For some years I was the only person with an interest in managing this task, but we had an official opening in 2006, by Mr Angus McLachlan, who had a connection to Mr Robert T. Melrose who provided the money and land for the building of the Hall.



It was the plan that the collection could be accessed by researchers, as needed. I am not sure just when the decision was made to open more regularly, but I decided to open weekly, and so advertising began and it is now recognised that the History Room, as it has become known, is open each Thursday afternoon, from February to December. Pauline Taheny joined me in this venture and for some years we were the two faces who greeted people as they researched their local family and/or their houses/property. Pauline made the move to Adelaide a



year ago, and she is sorely missed, as having grown up in the region, it was Pauline who often could remember some little detail that we could then research.

With the sale of the former Police Station it was lovely to see a new face venture to the room; Chris Birrell has been a regular almost from the very first week of moving to the township. Sue Barrett then joined the group, and can often be seen with muffins or flowers in hand, to add that extra flair to the facility. Margaret Parker and Merry Schaeffer join us for a catch-up and assist, and we were pleased to have Cheryl Farinola and Gareth Saunders join us recently... we may get to the number of 8 once again, and I wonder where that might lead us!

Cheryl and I attended a DNA Downunder event held in Adelaide, which will help in our family history research. I had completed my DNA test and



was hoping it would help prove that my 19th century family links were accurate, and so this information day has helped to understand just what the DNA can show.

Part of the Historical Research Group ethos is to recognise and perhaps celebrate the milestones for the township and district, and so we have reminded people that Talunga Park is celebrating 100 years since establishment. The key stakeholders have been contacted and at time of print, we are awaiting their response for a proposed recognition of this milestone, sometime in October... keep watch for more information regarding this.



Visit by author: Neville Collins









The team in SA launched the Member Branch Reconciliation Quilt Project on the 6th May. All branches were invited to design

a 10-inch quilt square on what reconciliation means to them. They were given a blank canvas to embroider, stitch, paint - any medium they wanted. The idea behind this was to encourage members to reflect on how they are taking steps towards reconciliation within their own communities. The initiative finishes in September.
