I've always loathed the term 'hero', especially when attached to a sportsperson, or some other human who has had the good fortune to be in the right place at the right time, and been saddled with the epithet.

Our CFS by and large would be uncomfortable with the mantle of 'hero', and discussions regarding the compensation mooted recently have been largely dismissed, but can you imagine if we didn't have a CFS? Glynn Jackson, Captain of the Mt Pleasant Brigade makes reference to the farmers with their equipment sometimes making all the difference, so even with basic training, these people have also been dubbed 'heroes'. Ambulance officers, Police Officers and other Emergency Services personnel are also in line for being called 'heroes', even though they train for just such eventualities, confronting The Beast - as Glynn and Pete so eloquently put it - is the stuff of all our worst nightmares. But these people are heroes.

The Hills is a small area compared to others throughout the country - and I won't use that phrase 'tight knit', because we aren't - but everyone knows someone who has been touched by the fires.

The man who was the inspiration for me starting this newsletter has lost his home, and even though he makes light of it, my heart is breaking for him. Don as President of the Hills group of JPs was horrified to learn their Treasurer has lost everything - although her horses are safe. Paula's daughter and son-in-law, although saving their almost completed house, have lost many of the tools that comprise their livelihood, as well as a large portion of their stock.

I'm sure more stories will come to light as we take stock and try to help those who have lost all recover and regroup.

There are many groups - some official and some on social media - which have been set up to help those in need, and I urge you to think of some way you can make a contribution. Not all of us can be heroes - some of us stand on the sidelines and applaud.

In the meantime, please heed the warnings put out by the CFS and government, this is only the start of the fire season, and there is more scorching weather to come. Don't be a statistic.

a message from Glynn

23 December at 18:53

I finally have time to reflect on the past few days and express my feelings and thoughts on the past few days which for my brigade and myself began at 8am on Friday morning, at the commencement of the tragedy that is the Cuddlee Creek fire.

Over the first two days I was on MP24 a dated Hino fire appliance with two of us in the cab and 2 on the back crew deck. My pride in my crews and all others crews grew by the minute, also the support we had back at our stations and staging areas was immense and immeasurable.

Out on the fire ground I saw many tragic scenes and many miracles. Bravery of not only fellow firefighter who are trained to be there, but the innumerable farm fire units swarming into fire front like bees to take on the item known as 'the beast'. Fearless and ever forceful in many areas they were the difference between the save instead of the loss.

(Sorry got called out for a house fire whilst writing this tome.)

So tragedies seen are the total devastation of both houses, shed and vehicles, and fauna, pets, horses, stock, livelihoods and infrastructure. The total loss of a house that my crew and I fought as hard as we could to save and barely making it out safe when I made the decision for us to pull out and drive through a wall of flames.

The look on my wife's face when I had her evacuated to our CFS shed with our dog whilst I was out fighting the beast, and when I told her today how much I appreciated her support and backing to do what I have and am continuing to do. Thank you so much Kehau.

Miracles I saw... so many times appliances saving houses and property by the barest minimum of time and distance. The aforementioned farm fire units brigades.

Crews from all over the state literally as far as SA/Vic border and Yorke Peninsula, the far mid-north, coming together to tell 'the beast' you will not win!!

Air support bombers dropping a load of fire-retardant foam exactly along the running grass fire line we were working with such precision.

I will end with an example that filled me with pride and overcame me with tears when it was related to me last night, concerning Mt Pleasant 24 crew who were on the truck 'freelancing' as we call it. Basically patrolling along and wherever you see an asset under attack go in and try to save it. The 3 crew members were consolidated with a ring in from another brigade.

They came to a residence with a long steep driveway that another unit came out of and said "can't get up to the house to defend it" and a shed had already gone alongside the house.

The crew leader of our unit looked up at the house and could see the Xmas tree and presents in the window, and turned to the driver alongside him and asked "what you reckon?" The reply was "I reckon yes, we can." The Crew Leader then asked the 2 guys on the back for a team decision as it was going to be very risky if they wanted to try. Without hesitation Goat Boy and SH from Springton Brigade said "Yes, let's do it, Snowy!"

So MDJ turned the truck around and reversed up the driveway to the house. Once there they were confronted with the fire almost at the house, a camper van with gas bottle attached to it which they were unable to remove from the camper. They then physically dragged the camper out from under the carport and proceeded to water under the house where the fire had encroached, watered down the corner of the house which was being attacked and established the perimeter around the house successfully saving it.

Before going, they left a message on the door saying "Mt Pleasant 24 saved your house. Happy Xmas"

Why the note? Because Snowy lost his house to a lightning strike fire in 2008, and said if it had been saved, he would have wanted to know who did it.

Apologies for my long post, but it's enabled me to bring my emotions under control.

On a side note, as I was about 3/4 of the way through typing this I was contacted by a former Captain of Mt Pleasant CFS, asking "Well how does it feel being Captain in an incident so alike to the Sampson Flat fire of a few years ago?" He knew what I was going through and had been thinking of me only 5 months into the role, knowing the many and often hard decisions I would have to make, as well as all the messages, ensuring the safety of the crews, balancing them with experience and emotional capabilities, keeping the trucks equipped for the tasks and many other things.

Thank you if you took out the time from your busy lives to read this journal.

To all my brigade members, front and back of house as it were, you are all worth your weight in gold (or fire-fighting foam hahaha)

Love to one and all and please stay safe and have a happy Christmas. Support those affected by the tragedy as best you can.

Oh BTW, yes we and other brigades are still recruiting new members!

Cudlee Creek Catastrophe

It's eight a.m., a burnt orange sun glowers out of the east. A westerly wind is switching, gusting, announcing the birth of The Beast.

In a scant thirty minutes the scrub is ablaze along Hannaford Creek Road, And Fox Creek Road, and Neudorf Road, fuelled by the tinder dry load

Of leaf litter, the twigs and debris of years, The Beast has waited too long. Now it crackles, it roars, and leap-frogs hilltop to hill, angry and greedy and strong.

Strike teams and CFS heroes try to tackle The beast at it's hub, But it rages, rampages, sweeps all aside, as it powers on through the scrub.

And it's boots on the ground, the bombers cleaving the air, For some it's too late, no time now to wait, and soon it's time for despair.

There's no stopping The Beast, as the wind gives it power. Sheds are ablaze, roads hedged with flame, it's worsening hour upon hour.

The first home succumbs, to the Firey's despair, the first of many we fear. We can't save the sheds, the fences, the stock, the priorities are only too clear.

Soon townships are threatened, endangered, as The Beast devours all in it's way, So beware Kenton Valley, and Birdwood and Loby, it's holocaust day.

Now man and machine are losing the fight, as we fall back, defend and retreat, Fall back! Fall back! While the ember attack is showering into the street.

The Bombers! Thank God for the bombers, without them all hope would be lost, The beast is berserk, loving it's work, as ridge tops and valleys are crossed.

Now the burnt orange sun doesn't blind us, as we toil in the smoke and the dust, Can we hold it? Or slow it? All we know is somehow we must!

We all have our loved ones and friends, who know they can trust us to fight, So with soot blackened faces, and red-rimmed eyes, we battle on into the night.

The Beast reigns supreme, though we work with a will. It scorches the valleys, cascades embers down, leaping to the next un-burnt hill.

Though fire trucks are lost, and fire breaks are crossed, no-one abandons the task. Police, Fireys, Farmers and Ambos, giving more than we ever should ask.

Soon, all to soon, the communities further away, feel the wrath of The Beast. Tungkillo, Harrogate, Bird-in-Hand, as the front roars away to the east.

Incredible! A whole week has now passed, with eighty plus homes now no more. A week of effort, courage and sacrifice, haven't avoided this horrible score.

Responders state-wide have answered the call, and sent their crews to our aid, With all the emergency forces, bone weary, appalled at the price that's been paid.

Still the families, the loved ones, loves us – and let us go, Knowing this is what we signed on for, but worrying even so.

But, 'til The Beast is subdued, the sun shines again, and the light, clear air returns, While still one tree-stump, one vineyard, one hay shed, one tree-lot still burns,

Out on the fire-ground, the battle-ground, out there in the ashes and dust, The volunteers, the farmers the ambos, will continue to do what they must!

A recovery centre to provide assistance and support to people affected by recent bushfires will be opened at Lobethal next week.

The centre will open at Fabrik Arts and Heritage in the Old Woollen Mill, 1 Lobethal Road at Lobethal, on Monday 6 January. Its operating hours will initially be 7am to 7pm, and this will be reviewed over time and adjusted based on community demand.

The centre will provide a range of assistance to people affected by the fire, including providing advice on their recovery, care and support, assistance with accommodation and administering grants.

Council update -

As many would be aware, my husband Don is a Councillor with The Barossa Council (TBC), as such I am at times privy to some behind the scenes workings of council. First and foremost, the primary role of council is not to fight fires, that is the role of paid employees - MFS and highly trained volunteers - CFS. Both groups have the necessary training and equipment to deal with fires. That doesn't mean councils don't become involved in the fire fighting effort.

On Friday the 20th of December TBC staff responded with works and tree crews to the Hillier Fire (Gawler Council) and then all weekend assisting with the Cudlee Creek fire (Adelaide Hills Council)

TBC responded via The Emergency Management Zone and the Zone Emergency Support Team (ZEST). SA Police coordinated ZEST and TBC provided two graders, two loaders and tree equipment. Additionally council provided anywhere up to 8 staff from Friday through to Sunday. This equipment and staff assisted with the road clean up, tree management and general access to the area for emergency services personnel and residents.

Besides this physical presence at these fire grounds council was also working behind the scenes, even though it wasn't needed, preliminary work was commenced to set up a relief centre at Lyndoch.

Not only did council undertake this work, but to ensure that water was readily available to fight the fires, the
