Rate info

For towns throughout The Barossa Council area Council needs money to deliver services and facilities. To that end each year Council needs to adopt a budget and a business plan. This year presented Council with many interesting challenges, accordingly before these were adopted Council endorsed a revised Rates Hardship Policy taking into consideration Covid19 and its impact upon ratepayers.

A little while back the Annual Budget and Business Plan went to public consultation with there being one submission. Consequently the Budget and Business Plan has been adopted. It includes an overall increase to general rate revenue from last year at 1.44% plus growth of 1.09%. What does this all mean? General rate revenue for Council will increase by about \$8K, and for ratepayers there will be an increase in general rates, spread across Council, of somewhere in the vicinity of about \$40.00 per assessment. Considering what Council delivers and the year that it has been through that is a remarkable effort, well done to the Barossa Council and its elected members.

Culture Hub

The Mayor Bim Lange and CEO Martin McCarthy also met recently with Member for Barker Tony Pasin to discuss the unsuccessful Building Better Regions grant application. The Mayor is seeking further feedback as to how the project will progress in the next round of funding.

Hospital changes

Response to COVID-19

Although the situation can change at any moment in response to what is happening, currently this is how things stand at our hospital.

A&E is closed until further notice. Angaston Hospital is open for emergencies, and Gumeracha Hospital will (hopefully) open in mid-August for emergencies.

Clinpath offers a pathology service (blood tests) which only occurs on Mondays, Wednesdays and Friday, between the hours of 8.30am to 12.00pm.

MPPA Inc.

(Mt Pleasant Progress Association Inc.)

Here is an update overview from the recent Mount Pleasant Progress Inc. meetings held in June and July, 2020. Business Arising:

- Development on the Showgrounds/Markets ATCO toilets is still ongoing. Costs for asbestos removal has been delivered to the Barossa Council. No further contact from the Council to date. An email will be sent to Rob Nies and Rebecca Tappert re cost of removing asbestos.
- The Draft Barossa Council Services Management Agreement for the Management Services of the Talunga Recreation and Caravan Park has been discussed with Genevieve Hebart, Wendy Harvey, and TBC. Currently being reviewed by all members.
- The 'Project Informed', the MP Information Kiosk structure is ongoing. Paul Johnson met with the Legatus Group who did not seem particularly interested in our project. Grant funding for project may be the only option at this stage. There has been no further action as all new initiatives have been deferred for this year due to COVID-19 Pandemic. TBC has previously indicated there would be no funds forthcoming this year. Further discussion will ensue.
- The SM Hall kitchen upgrade cost quotes came in between \$130k and \$160k., as the use of the kitchen does not warrant this level of expenditure. We will not proceed with the grant application at this stage. We will however, consider a grant application for installation of a lift in the second round of grant applications later this year.
- The Council has decided on the initiatives for \$1m drought funding which include Tourism (town signs), a water supply to Eden Valley, Mt Pleasant and Moculta: Barossa Bush gardens infrastructure and footpaths. There was a lengthy discussion about the appropriateness of these decisions even though they are based on the Federal Government's criteria for funding. The process has not been completed with submissions now needing to be made to the Federal Government for approval. These ideas may still not gain approval. It was agreed that there probably is not anything that can be

done at this stage as a "consultation process" has been seen to be done. Wendy Harvey will look through Council information for further ideas.

Finances:

- MP Progress Inc. has \$9,942.97 in its working account.
- Community Dinner has \$9,960.94.
- SALA has \$814.42.
- Insurance payment for MP Progress Inc. body of \$1765.27 has been made.
- It was noted that all areas, SM Hall, Talunga Park and Caravan Park accounts are in the black.
- The 2018/2019 finances have been audited by Karen Hegarty.

Correspondence:

The letter from Light Regional Council re Septic tank for Atco toilets was noted.

It was noted that the Council has been reminded about the \$20k made available to do a feasibility study on the Hybrid power solution for Talunga Park.

The grassed area in front of the Show/Market Hall has been shelved until next year due to costs and requirements of Council.

Sub Committee reports:

Talunga Park:

A new lawnmower has been purchased to be used at Talunga Park and Caravan Park.

Some concerns expressed about the soft ground on the oval and the horse traffic on it.

The Soldier's Memorial Hall:

Noted that the Council require COVID-19 Management Plans and licence agreements prior to anyone re-occupying any of the areas in the SM Hall.

It was noted that there are some activities occurring in the hall and it is not known if permission has been granted by Council. Clarification will be sought.

The Community Dinner:

This will resume on the 26th of July as a Christmas in July dinner. Permission has been gained for this event to occur.

Councillor Discussions:

Upgrade to MP tennis Courts will occur to the tune of \$525,000.

Business and Community Grants (COVID related) will be available soon.

The MP Show Society has received a grant for a new office. Chris Hebart is on the executive committee and will keep us informed of progress with this new build.

New Business:

- The 'Fit and 50s' Group, which has been operating for many years in the Pavilion, has requested that it come under the auspices of the MP Progress Inc. body for insurance purposes. The insurance company has agreed for that to occur, as long as the group becomes a formal sub-committee. It was agreed by the group that this would be a good idea. Genevieve Hebart will write to the group confirming the agreement. Wendy Harvey will formulate a reporting document for them to use.
- Genevieve Hebart has been forwarding the Council COVD-19 plans to all groups in the community.
- It was agreed that the MP Progress Inc. AGM should be held on the 8th September, 2020. Genevieve Hebart will prepare the appropriate paper work.

- The Farmers Market will be using part of the most southern cattle shed for storage
- The email from Regional Development about a volunteer management system has been emailed to members. It was agreed that the capacity of this system was far in excess of the volunteer requirements of this group.
- Gareth Saunders presented the 'My Home Hospital' Information from the Democracy Co. organisation, associated with the SA Health Department, which the Men's Shed, through its president, Murray Henderson, has participated in an initial on-line community seminar session. This is about changes to health and hospital care for people.
- Gareth also presented a document on the SA Govt plan for Ageing Well. Wendy Harvey will investigate this area further.
- John Bowd requested that a brass plaque be installed for those people who have donated towards the planting of the trees at Talunga park. Genevieve Hebart will follow this up. A decision needs to be made as to where this may be placed.
- Support for the Habitat Recovery Alliance (following the Cudlee Creek bushfires) from MP Progress Inc. was noted. There is no cost to MP Progress Inc.
- The MP Showgrounds Shed Mural has been completed and Graeme Westwood has been paid for his work.
- Other ideas for grant funding at the end of the year are for wall lining and a new floor in the catering shed, The CWA Garden, and air conditioning in the pavilion.
- Talunga Park Caravan Park is full.
- The pavilion ceiling has been painted.
- The MP progress Inc. Strategic Plan is on hold.
- Proposed Drainage work in front of the MP Show grounds Atrium is pending.
- Genevieve Hebart talked about discussions she has had with Simon Taylor from the Southern Barossa Alliance about an e-community support system for people within the Barossa area. This would have information on activities, support services, what is open and what is not etc., relating to individual towns. It was agreed that Sue Barrett would be the most appropriate person within the town to manage this. Genevieve will speak with her and refer her to Simon Taylor.

The meeting closed at 9pm. The **next meeting** is to be held at the MP Men's Shed on Tuesday, August 11th, at 7pm.

In The Leader on 1st July it was reported that the Show Society was to receive a Federal Grant to help them recoup some of the monies lost as a result of the cancellation of our show this year. The amount of the grant is \$124,000, which will be used to build a new administration block – replacing the old and decrepit Atco hut. This will be jointly used by the Show Society and the Pony Club, with the facility also available for hire as a meeting room.

The committee have since been meeting to decide on the final design, and it's hoped that it will be up and running early in the new year.

"Very exciting to today announce \$197,000 in Grassroots Facilities funding for upgrades to the Mount Pleasant Netball and Tennis clubs today! The project, worth a total \$525,000, will see six tennis courts upgraded to full size and sports flood lighting installed to increase sporting opportunities in the area. Mount Pleasant Gems Netball Club has gone from strength to strength since being reinvigorated in 2017 after a 10-year hiatus, and these improved facilities will only help it to continue to grow and flourish.

This is backed by the commitment of both the netball and tennis clubs to provide significant financial support to this project, for which they should be highly commended."



As Captain Starlight was reported to have at least visited Palmer to sell his rustled cattle, many people believe he popped over the hill to Mt Pleasant. It was filmed largely in the Flinders, and apparently around Palmer, although it was hard to tell where.

We had a small and appreciative group for the showing, and the hall was a great place for it. The blinds blocked out just enough sunlight to make it easy to see the movie, and the air conditioning kept the room at a comfortable temperature. We well remember the days when holding anything in the hall in winter was a no go.

We had plenty of compliments on the soup, so have included the Chicken and Peanut soup recipe after this article. It will also be available on the website.

The next Soup 'n Cinema lunch will be held on the 6th of August, when we will be showing the first part of the Bryan Brown series 'The Shiralee', a wonderful story about the developing relationship between a hard-bitten bloke and his daughter. Mt Pleasant connection to Simpson

Further to the RSL report (page 13) which includes a reference to Simpson and his Donkey, did you know there was a direct connection with two Mt Pleasant soldiers?

From a 1965 Sunday Mail interview with Corporal Heinrich Drabsch:


"Shrapnel Gully was our highway. We went up it to the line and down it to some sort of rest. I saw a chap with a donkey. I didn't know he was Simpson then. I did wonder now and then how a man could break away from his unit and work alone. Where did he get his rations, and who answered at roll call? But it was every man for himself and if he wanted to do it that way, it wasn't my worry. I passed him one day on his way up Shrapnel Gully, coming down with a man on his donk. I didn't really give him a second glance. Further up I met Murray Bax. He was one of the Last Horse then, as the Light Horsemen who had to leave their mounts in Alexandria called themselves.",

"Did you see Alec?" he asked. "He went down on the donkey. He got knocked."

"I could not go to the dressing station to see my old friend. I was on my way up to supports that night. Alec died..."

The rest of the interview may be found in Paula's book 'Remember Our Diggers' available for purchase from the History Room.

Three of the Bax boys (Alec, Murray and Ben) died during or shortly after World War one. Mrs. Bax had hung bags of camphor around the necks of the Mt Pleasant boys (including Heinrich) as they left for the war. Mr Charles Bax worked for Bagot Shakes and Lewis, and they lived in the old Elders house.




Men's Shedding

The latest addition of Simpson and his donkey silhouetted against the white wall of the neighbouring property instantly draws attention to the facility.

For your information Simpson was named John Kirkpatrick Simpson, and he was born in Tyne Dock County Durham UK on July 6 1892

In the first world war he was attached to the 3rd Australian Field Ambulance during the Gallipoli Campaign.

Simpson used donkeys to get wounded soldiers to medical help for 3 weeks but was tragically killed in action by machine gun fire at Gallipoli on 19 December, 1915.

For his actions he was Mentioned in Dispatches, and his donkey Murphy was awarded a Purple Cross by the Australian RSPCA.

Many attempts were made to get Simpson a VC but it was deemed he did nothing more than many others who risked their lives getting first aid to the wounded.

In June the facility was used for a three-day training course by the District CFS under The Barossa Council COVID requirements. They are looking forward to conducting further training sessions there. They were very impressed by the Military collection.

Mount Pleasant RSL members are looking forward to reintroducing the Friday sausage sizzle outside the Mount Pleasant Post Office in the near future, and are also scheduled to attend The Farmers Market Gate in November.

Bits & Bobs

Soup n Cinema Recipe

This is the recipe I use for the soup I made for the luncheon. I got the idea from Murray Henderson, although his uses a big dash of sherry! I also only add half a teaspoon of Cayenne Pepper, as some people may not like it so hot – this makes it warm enough to be spicy, but nowhere near hot enough to make your lips tingle. And note that Cilantro is indeed, Coriander.

(Even though I like Coriander, I often don't add it as some people think it tastes like poison!)

West African Peanut Soup with Chicken



When you make this, start at least 2 hours before plan to eat. There is not a lot of active time, but the stew needs time to simmer. If you prefer a vegetarian version of, swap in vegetable broth and perhaps kick up the spice.

Course: Soup Servings: 10 people

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon coconut oil or olive oil
- \Box 1 large onion

Prep Time

15 mins

2-3 inch piece of ginger peeled and minced (a microplane makes quick work of this)

Total Time

1 hr 35 mins

- 5 large cloves garlic peeled and minced
- 2 large sweet potatoes scrubbed and diced (peeled if you like)
- 1 28 ounce jar chopped tomatoes with juice (or can)
- 4 cups chicken stock
- □ 1 cup chunky peanut butter
- □ 1 tablespoon ground coriande
- 🗌 1 teaspoon cayenne
- 14 ounce can coconut milk (I used full-fat)
- 2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs cut in half lengthwise
- \square salt and freshly ground black pepper
- □ 1 cup roasted peanuts for garnish
- □ fresh chopped cilantro for garnish

Instructions

- Heat oil in a soup pot over medium heat. Add onion; cook and stir for 3-4 minutes until translucent. Add ginger and garlic; cook and stir 30 seconds, just until fragrant. Add the next 7 ingredients – sweet potatoes through coconut milk. Stir until well combined and peanut butter is distributed. Stir in chicken thighs to and bring to boil. Reduce heat and cover; simmer for one hour.
- Remove the chicken thighs and set them aside for a few moments until they're cool enough to handle. Use two forks to shred chicken, then return to stew.
- Add salt, freshly ground black pepper, and more cayenne to taste. Ladle into individual soup bowls and garnish with peanuts and cilantro. Serve.
