Footpaths...

Over twenty years ago, when ratepayers had the choice of going to either the Adelaide Hills, Murraylands or Barossa Councils, could we have envisaged our current situation? It seems we are constantly in the 'too hard' basket.

In October last year, the state of the footpath on the opposite side of the road to the Kindergarten, which many students from the primary school also access, not to mention residents, was brought up in a Barossa Council meeting. This footpath's 'use by' date had long since passed and been adjusted to sometime in the future. An undertaking was given to assess the matter and attend to it in the next budget. It's not unusual for paths and roads to be inspected and the time for upgrading or attention extended. If a path is indeed in good repair, this makes good economic sense, but I'm pretty sure this particular stretch of footpath is not. Apart from the last bit of footpath slated to be upgraded in Melrose Street, and the lack of footpaths on other streets, this one has to be the worst in the town. (pics bottom left) I guess you could say that it doesn't have much traffic (compared to what?), but as an access path that school children and kindergarten children use (could use if it was in better condition), it should be in much better condition. It certainly shouldn't be one that people cross the road to avoid.


Electoral boundaries & possible legislation Interesting to read in *The Courier* about the proposed changes in the Electoral Boundaries. (see page 2) I wonder what people will think about being added to the seat of Kavel? It looks like it makes more sense than being in Schubert, and certainly more sense than being lumped with Morialta as was the case last time a change was proposed. But then again – same same, as both are in safe Liberal seats. Not much help there – but the times they are a'changing. It does give us something other than COVID-19 to talk about.

There is also some interesting legislation going to parliament shortly, which includes a proposal that people who are homeless be taken off the electoral roll so they won't be chased for not voting. That would effectively mean that they would not have a vote - in a democracy, that's not a good thing. Homelessness is everywhere, and just because you don't see it here, doesn't mean the district doesn't have a problem. David Bevan's ABC radio programme included discussion regarding alternative measures that could be taken. The other topic is changes to the way we vote perhaps getting rid of preferential voting. This might lead us to an American style where someone who is deeply unpopular may only get 25% of the vote, but could still win. Preferential voting, although it can take time to do properly (if you don't vote upon party lines) seems to ensure that the most popular candidate wins the seat (unless a candidate gets 50% or more first preferences - then they can't lose - so they are declared the winner without the preferential votes being counted).

Council snippets COVID-19 Recovery Grants



Council Launches COVID-19 Recovery Grants

As part of their \$470,000 COVID-19 Recovery Plan Council is pleased to be launching the \$150,000 business and community grant program to provide support to assist in community and economic recovery within the Council area. Business grants of \$1000 to \$3000 are being targeted at micro and small businesses within the tourism, hospitality, retail and creative industries sectors. Community grants of \$500 to \$3000 are available to not-for-profit organisations and community groups. The grants will provide funding of up to 66% of costs that have or will be incurred by eligible businesses or groups.

Recognising the entrepreneurialism of the area's groups and businesses, the grant committee will consider any ideas that support a business or group to be sustainable during the pandemic. In addition to the COVID-19 recovery grants, Council's rolling Community Assistance Scheme continues to operate, with an increase of \$150,000 over the next two years.

"The Draft Report, published by the EDBC, consists of its reasons for proposing that the electoral boundaries be altered. Copies of the Draft Report are available for inspection or purchase for \$30 (Cash or Cheque only) from the Electoral Commission SA, Level 6, 60 Light Square, Adelaide. Copies have been provided to all persons who made a written representation.

In accordance with section 85(6) of the Constitution Act, the Commission invites any person who has already made a representation to the Commission in relation to this redistribution, or any interested member of the public, to make any final submission in writing that he or she thinks fit about the draft order (including the reasons that support it), within one month. The Commission will then consider all such submissions and it may, at its discretion, hear and consider any evidence or argument relating to any or all of those submissions.

Submissions must be lodged with the Secretary to the Commission, Mr David Gully, either by post to GPO Box 646, Adelaide SA 5001 or by email EDBC.secretary@sa.gov.au) no later than 5.00pm on Wednesday, 16 September 2020.

The Commission will then proceed to finalise its order."



What's in a name?

When explorers and settlers moved through the various districts, they named hills, rivers, and the like after what to them was important, be it a person they admired or a district from which they had come, or simply their own family name. Such was the naming of Mount Pleasant it seems, with James Phillis and his family being recognised for this name, although just why is not clear... possibly after the area from which they came in Kent, or in admiration of the sister of James, who was named Pleasant.



When researching just when the name for Mount Pleasant came into use, I found that there was a Mount Pleasant near Enfield and another near Victor Harbor not to mention all the others interstate. The first mention of Mount Pleasant Inn, in our vicinity, that I could find reference to in the newspapers of the day was in 1853, but there had been settlers in the region from 1843. Very early on the area was known as the Eastern Sources of the Torrens, and I am glad it was at least shortened to 'Mount Pleasant'... but the actual surveying of this township did not occur until later.

In 1855 a survey was carried out by Mr. S. Partridge for Henry Giles for a section of land to be known as Totness. This was the section of today's Mount Pleasant from Pentelows Road to Saleyard Road. It included an acre of land as a site for 'the erection of a Place of Public Worship' which is now the Primary School. In August 1855 it was agreed by Mr Giles 'to curve the road round the water-hole in the township of Totness without expense to the District' and comment was made regarding the availability of good stone on the ground for building.

In 1860 Daniel and Robert Miller were granted a Shopkeepers licence, and both the Totness Inn and Mount Pleasant Inn received certificates for general Publican's licences. The Mount Pleasant Inn had been rebuilt to today's situation after the original Inn, which was situated on the other side of the river, had burnt to the ground. The licence granted the following year, in 1861, states the name as the Talunga Hotel, with Josiah W. Daniel being granted a Shopkeeper's licence at Totness and Robert Miller at Mount Pleasant, which by December 1861 was granted to Robert Wyllie.

By the mid 1860s the mention of Totness as a township was not evident within the newspapers of the day, however, that of Mount Pleasant was, with the Totness Inn mentioned regularly for the venue for meetings, inquests, and celebrations. The Totness Inn of that day was razed to the ground in 1918 and rebuilt as the building we see today.

In recent times I have noticed the business area near Mount Barker being referred to as Totness, with the various businesses having that as their address and so indicating that Totness is a 'suburb' of Mount Barker. I wondered why this was chosen as a name for that region and on investigation on the TROVE website and the historical newspapers I found mention of Little Totness and East Totness Road near to Mount Barker as early as the 1880s. In fact, a Mr Thomas Green was found dead at his property at Totness in 1909.

It seems though, that we could possibly claim the earliest use of Totness, which was named after the district from which Mary Ann Giles came in England, and it was her husband Henry, who arranged the survey and sale of the land at Totness, Mount Pleasant. Enquiries to Mount Barker Visitor Centre have proved fruitless, so it needs more research with the History Centre there to determine my claim. I do hope, though, that anyone at Mount Barker who may be looking for the Totness Inn realises that they actually have to come to Mount Pleasant to find it!
