This last year Sophie has been busy - not that she wasn't busy before, but crazy busy! When she last spoke to us ,she told us about the immediate effect on our flora and fauna in the aftermath of the devastating Cudlee Creek and Kangaroo Island fires. Her insight into the devastation was eye opening, and the suggestions and hope she offered gave us all something to work for. During this year, she has been heavily involved with revegetating Kangaroo Island providing and facilitating gardening advice, plants and materials to all those affected, and thereby helping the healing process. She contacted businesses like Balhannah Nurseries who donated fruit trees, and \$70,000 was donated from nursery and allied industries. The Community Garden in Kingscote was re-jigged, one established in Parndarna. She worked with garden clubs to give gardeners what they missed most. Hope.

Sophie is a big proponent of nature's healing process.

During the lockdowns with COVID-19, the statistics of suicide and depression were horrifying. People were unable to access things and people who could support and help them, people who suffer from depression were particularly at risk

Sophie found herself in the position that as a public speaker, she couldn't continue her work, as speakers need an audience, and there were no events occurring, so she made podcasts in cooperation with the Mt Barker Council.

This is a free, Government funded, not for profit advisory service for Rural and regional town businesses supporting them in seeking grants and accessing funds. Erica was invited to attend the MP Market on Saturday to meet small business owners.

Business arising / ongoing:

The Show building project has been agreed to and extra funding from Barossa Council is available.

Still no further action on the Management Plan.

Genevieve and Wendy attended the Barossa Council workshop and felt that the idea of having a lift in the Soldier's Memorial Hall was well received. Still awaiting formal feedback.

The plaque re trees donations has been finalised but will not be installed until after the removal of the large pine trees.

The pamphlet development working group has met twice. Wendy is to get in touch with a graphic designer. Genevieve to contact local artists.

SM Hall hiring fees for local groups remain of concern. A proposal will be out to the Barossa Council for consideration once fees are announced as part of the Council budget setting process.

There has been contact with Steve Kaesler re the drainage at the front of the Show Hall and atrium. The works are now to be costed



Limbs had been falling – not a good thing when they were near a picnic spot and playground – and an arborist's report concluded they should be removed. Fortunately, there are two sturdy Oaks which had been planted in the area some time ago, which will now have room to grow and provide shade in the future. As far as immediate shade, the council doesn't provide shade for any of its playgrounds, so it may be up to the town bodies to apply for grant funding to ensure kids have a safe environment in which to play.


In the Australian legal system, we have what is called a 'presumption of innocence', which broadly means innocent until proved guilty. In other countries, this is not so clear, and in some, it is more like 'guilty until proved innocent'. But no matter what the case – small or large - it all relies on evidence.

Recently on a local Facebook page, there were reports of people receiving what may or may not be legitimate paperwork relating to dog nuisance. If people have issues with dog nuisance, the proper authority to report this to, is the council, unless there is an offence like a dog attack, then it is a police matter. If you are having an issue such as a dog barking and disrupting sleep, being a nuisance or whatever, it is always the best response if you try and have a quiet word with the owner in the first instance. Always try to be reasonable and factual, and take emotion out of the equation. Many times, this can be resolved quickly, and you may have a better relationship with your neighbour in the process. Win. win.

If you didn't get the response you anticipated, then reporting to the council may be the next step BUT – before you do take this further – keep a written log (and copy). Whether it's hoons tearing up the street every Friday night, or a dog barking at all hours, the police or the council will require evidence. Photographic or video evidence is also handy if it is a police or council matter. Metadata on the file doesn't lie, and it can be useful to back up your claim.

No-one will listen if you have some vague account of a dog being a nuisance, the road being dangerous, or footpaths needing repair, if you can't back up your words with evidence. It's also no good just telling someone about the issue – this is not viewed as a formal complaint. Create a paper trail as this will also help your cause. If you have evidence, it may speed things up and facilitate the resolution of your particular issue. Good luck!

She is also a vegetable gardener with a patch that was producing lots of produce and nowhere to give it – until she hooked up with a trainer for the Chef's School who was training international students – who also had nowhere to go, and who were unable to access assistance. The Chef School produced 8 meals a week for the students for three months, giving the students who needed it sustenance, and those who created the meals something to focus on other than themselves.

So many new initiatives came out of what was a pretty bleak time for most of us. Gardening is a way of getting in touch with nature, getting us outside and thinking of something other than not being able to do what we would normally be doing.



Sophie usually brings a large number of plants to illustrate her talks, and this year she had brought quite a few plants that attracted native bees, and while she was talking, some Blue

Banded Bees (pictured above) were busy investigating the flowers, along with quite a few butterflies, which pleased us all no end. Gardening tip: Apparently those bees are particularly good for pollinating tomatoes. After her talk, she spent a long time chatting with gardeners and passing on more tips, while we cleaned her out of plants and almost all her books!

Sophie never disappoints, but I think this was one of her better ones There was so much more I could add, but I haven't got the room here. She talked about hope, renewal, getting back to nature, caring and sharing, and it was funny, sad, uplifting and informative – all at once.

Kath's already booked her for next year, and we look forward to another great talk.



'Quiet Waters By' news



As many locals would know, author Reg Butler was commissioned by the Mount Pleasant Council to write a history of the Mount Pleasant District, which was published in 1993. Sadly it sold out - which was great for Reg – but not so good for people who wanted to buy a copy afterwards. We have been investigating for some time the feasibility of doing a re-print of Reg's work, as he has given us permission to do so. This has been problematical in that the original publisher has a copy of the text, but not the pictures.



A couple of years ago, Sue and I attended a workshop in Nuriootpa, run by the GLAM (Galleries, Libraries, Archives & Museums) and we discovered that the South Australia Police Historical Society owned a

sophisticated scanner, that was better than the equipment in the State Library. This got us thinking that we might be able to

approach them and commission a copy that we could reprint. Then 2020 happened, and we put the idea on hold, whilst thinking about how we could fund such a project.

Recently we met with Maxine Harding (pictured below left) from the SAPHS, who has taken one of our precious copies of the book into her safekeeping, and will not only copy the book, but will also do it for free! We were overwhelmed by this kind offer and it makes our search for funding the printing a lot less stressful.

Once we receive the data from Maxine, we will be able to approach a publisher with a view to printing more copies of the book. This will not be an easy – or cheap – process.

What we would like people to do, is register an expression of interest with us, and we might have a better idea of how many copies to aim for.

Health Talking

Diabetes - with Sara Attwood

It was a sombre reminder to Shedders to take their health seriously, when Sara Attwood for the Talunga Clinic dropped in for the latest free health talk at the Men's Shed. Sara spoke specifically about Type 2 Diabetes, and how although not curable – it can be managed with diet and exercise. In many ways, the information she shared was not dissimilar to the talk from the Heart Foundation in January. Type 1 Diabetes is a condition where the body produces no insulin, which is essential for the body to function. Insulin is produced in the Pancreas, and assists in moving glucose to the cells. This type of diabetes necessitates injections of insulin – and it was interesting to note how far the delivery of insulin has come. It is much less of an ordeal than it was in the past.

Type 2 Diabetes may be managed through diet, exercise and medication. This type is progressive, and develops gradually. Some people may have had it for 10 to 15 years before side effects are noticed.

Sara stressed that you don't have to cut things out of your diet, just manage them. The thinking is that there is no specific 'Diabetes Diet', more 'Healthy Eating'. To do this, you may just have to reduce the amount you are eating. For instance, if you looked at your dinner plate, it should consist of ¼ meat or protein, ¼ carbohydrates (potatoes, rice pasta),

and ½ vegetables. It doesn't mean you can't have Tim Tams – if they are your passion – just cut back. Eating in moderation is the way to go.

Sara's talk was enlightening and interesting, and there are far too many details to mention here, but if you suspect that you may be heading towards these conditions, there is some great information available on the diabetessa.com.au website. Here you will find a list of signs and symptoms and help with living with diabetes. If you are experiencing any of the symptoms listed – and there are a few – please make an appointment with your doctor soon. The sooner you start managing the symptoms, the sooner you can get on with living a full and productive life.

Sara's talk was really challenging, confronting and helpful, and in many ways more positive regarding how people may help themselves.






