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Injecting the truth

This COVD-19 event has been an interesting phenomenon. The science is telling us that it will be with us forever - we have to get used to it and modify our behaviour. Not necessarily a bad thing in some ways, but devastating to think that many things we relished will no longer happen thinking mass events like large music festivals and pageants. Interesting too, to listen to or read the words of so-called 'experts'. I prefer to listen to those who actually have the qualifications to guide us - people like Dr Norman Swan (Physician, Journalist and broadcaster), or Professor MaryLouise McLaws (Epidemiologist with WHO - amongst many other things) - and my local GP.

Australia has been very lucky, and contrary to what some politicians would like to think, the main thing that saved us from the dramas that countries elsewhere have experienced, is geography. Australia is an island - a long way from anywhere (along with New Zealand). Closing the borders was a relatively easy thing to do when people have to come here by plane or boat. Quarantining arrivals was a good thing also - although this could have been handled a lot better (again - why didn't they listen to the scientists? It is apparently OK to refurbish a decommissioned detention facility for a photo op at the cost of \$185M (Guardian - Apr 2019), but not to use it for quarantine). Hotels are really not the place for quarantine- and keeping someone inside with no access to fresh air is pretty awful and not at all healthy. And now, after being the poster country (happy accident) for

handling the pandemic, we have proven that we couldn't organise a chook raffle. The US - held up for the last year as how NOT to handle a pandemic, has apparently been able to vaccinate 231million (95 million fully vaccinated) of their 332 million population in the last few months (as at 28 Apr) - despite the mess Trump left. Even England has got off its backside and pulled off an amazing mass vaccination.

The constraints that doctors are working under in Australia verge on the ridiculous. After years of medical school and residencies, etc, suddenly they are not capable of managing vaccinations and have to have special training, as does every other medical professional involved. Deliveries of promised vaccines have been very slow at best, and non-existent at worst. Some places have been given more than they need others, very little or none.

Old people in nursing homes are considered the most vulnerable in the community. They are very often frail, and susceptible to these types of infections. And here's the kicker. Most of the people who work in these homes represent a much younger demographic, they come, they go. In other words - they leave the safe haven of the nursing home and go out into the wider community, and then they come back. They are listed as one of the priority groups, yet how many stories do we hear of homes with NO vaccinations for workers? The people who are most likely to spread the virus. are those who are mobile, younger - more social. These may be the super-spreaders - and these are the ones we need to



vaccinate early. Finally, something we boomers can throw back on the millennials!

The lesson here for all of us is, when your doctor says it's time for your vaccination – you need to have it. If you've had yearly 'Flu shots – it will be just like that. It's a fact of life, now. In the meantime, there are plenty of lessons learned that we need to keep doing –

Wash your hands! Pretty basic – but surprisingly overlooked. And don't mix with people if you don't feel well! Or, you could just go out into the community and spread stuff around... but could you really live with yourself if you knew, did it anyhow, and someone you care for became really ill – because of you...

The meeting closed at 8.30 pm.







The group will also be collecting on the Mt Pleasant Farmer's Market gate on 29th May.



The Mt Pleasant Bowling Club has been invited to join the Barossa Bowling Association. The club is currently in the




