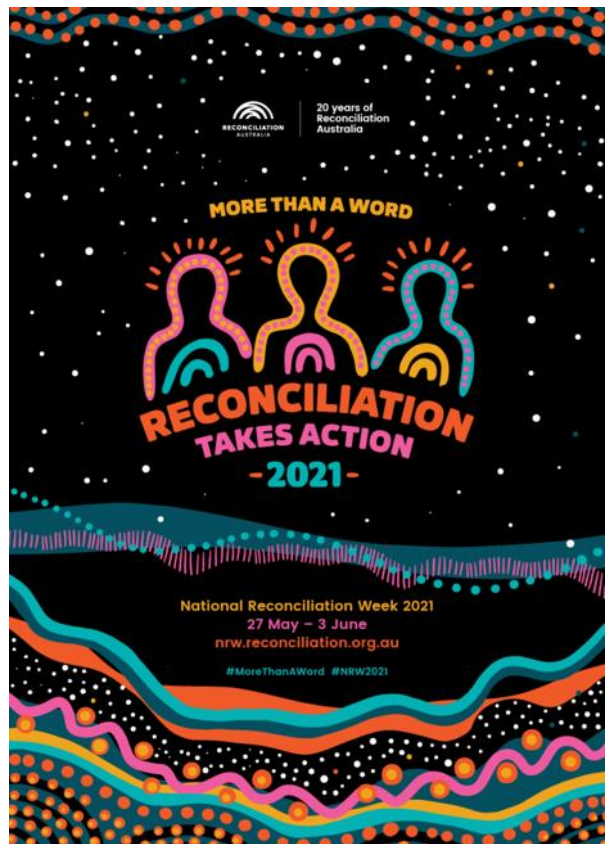

# Older People Have Rights

The Office for Ageing Well has launched its 2021 Stop Elder Abuse campaign.

Respecting the rights of older people is a critical step in tackling elder abuse.

Older people have the right to safety, dignity and autonomy:

- To be safe
- To be treated in a way that makes them feel worthwhile
- To be free to live the life they choose.

It is vital that families, friends and the broader community respect older people’s rights but, if abuse is suspected, do something about it, in a way that upholds those rights.

Particularly given that one in 20 older people in our community is experiencing some form of abuse from someone they know and trust – often a member of their own family.

How do you know what to look for?

Signs of elder abuse can be fear, sadness, and neglect.

Forms of abuse include financial, psychological, physical, social, neglect, sexual and chemical – such as over or under medication.

If you are being abused, or you believe someone else is, help is available.

In South Australia, most cases of elder abuse are financial, often coupled with psychological abuse.

Older women are more likely to be experiencing abuse, commonly from an adult son or daughter.

If you are being abused, or you know someone who is, say something.

Seek free confidential advice and support or make a report to South Australia’s Adult Safeguarding Unit.

# Pleasant History

## Barossa History Fair

The Barossa Regional Heritage Network has been meeting now for more than five years. It represents over 20 heritage organisations, most located within The Barossa Council region but also includes groups from the Light, Gawler and Mid Murray Council regions. The Network is an initiative of The Barossa Council Library History sector and has the support of the Library staff.

Because we are recognised by Council, it was necessary to develop a Regional Heritage Strategy, and this was developed and approved with much assistance from the Council staff, and in particular Tania Paull, who, as Manager Library and Heritage Services, guided the Network throughout from 2014 to January 2021 when she then moved to a new position at the City of Holdfast Bay. Before leaving though, Tania made sure that our latest Strategy for 2021 to 2025 was completed and it has recently been presented and approved by The Barossa Council, and I would like to thank Tania for that support. Copies of this for those interested are available today.

The Network comprises many small groups, each recording, preserving, promoting and sharing their research, and in particular, their knowledge of their own particular area. We aim to share our own appreciation of our community, and the history behind the settlement, so that the stories of the people and the buildings, and thus the identity, is not lost. Volunteers are welcomed within all the groups, to collate, research and assist with enquiries, which may give researchers access to material that can be rare and difficult to locate. Currently digitisation is a large part of being able to preserve and share the collections, and there is a need for those with skills and/or the willingness to learn the skills required, to enable this to occur. Support from the Museums & Collections (MAC) programme within the History Trust of

SA, gives access to small and large grants, and the chance to discuss the best steps to preservation, allowing small organisations to dream big and feel included in the wider history community.

Local groups are the experts who can assist those who wish to conduct tours and visits. We should be the first port of call for anyone who is promoting the history and heritage of the region. Many of these groups are more than willing to open their doors at times that may be outside their normal hours of opening, and by making contact a booking can be made which makes your tour or visit much more pertinent, informative and enriching.

Collaboration within our Network has assisted all of us to appreciate what we all have to share, and to create a stronger presence with the establishment of heritage experiences within the cultural tourism sector. The connection, discussion and co-operation we share within our groups helps give a greater understanding of the region and its heritage places and traditions for us, and then the ability to pass on that knowledge to the wider community. Our quarterly meetings give us an opportunity to keep in touch and create plans for the region more broadly, and to encourage a particular idea, such as recording the various changes of German/English names of various localities, and having signage to indicate these changes as many other regions have done.

Since our inception we have attempted to have a regular Heritage column within the local newspaper in the hope of reminding the public generally that our heritage is recognised and worthy of recognition and preservation.

We have compiled and launched the Barossa Heritage map, which gives an overall indication of what heritage places can be visited throughout the whole of The Barossa Council area. Without our regular collaborative meetings such an idea would not have come to fruition, nor would it have had the pertinence that this map has with the local knowledge making sure that appropriate points of interest are marked. Likewise, an update of the book on the history of the Barossa was achieved in less than 12 months with each member of the Network compiling a history of their region and “The Barossa: Federation to the Fifties” was the result. With thanks to the Barossa Valley Archives and Historical Trust Inc funding was procured and so it came to be printed. These are still available for purchase as is the original “The Barossa: a vision realised”.

The Visitor Information Centre is also represented at our Network meetings and reminds us of the best way to promote our organisations and events whilst becoming aware of just what is on offer throughout the region for those visitors who appreciate heritage and not necessarily wine... or perhaps both.

And, of course, we have The History Festival which allows much wider advertising of what is on offer, and The Barossa History Fair, of which we are a part today.

I would now like to introduce our current project which is that of an App which can be downloaded for free on a smartphone or tablet, via Google or Apple, and is a biking, driving or walking tour. Funding was secured from the Peter Lehmann Art and Education Trust Fund, to enable this to happen, and as a Network, it can be more advantageous to gaining such funding. Light Pass, Angaston, Bethany, and Mount Pleasant were named as the pilot walks and these

groups have been diligently researching the detail, photos and audio to create a quality product. Using the My Tours platform has provided an opportunity to tell a story that cannot be explained on print-based maps, and also reach an audience that is very much 'eyes down' and perhaps encourage them to see what is in front of them, but with the added detail of photos of the past and recordings of the memories of those who have lived in the region.

We are very close to having this completed, but of course, there is much in the background preparation that can stymie the best laid plans, and so the App is not currently available, but will be very soon, with the four districts mentioned, and then further walks will be detailed for the other areas of the district, so that tourists can use this to explore the whole region.

I encourage you all, to visit the various organisations within the region you may be visiting, and if you are a tour operator contact the local heritage places of interest to assist in making that visit more authentic. Importantly though please don't forget that all these groups need to raise their own funds for the preservation of the history that we are all able to access, and please take the opportunity to make a contribution to their fundraising.

I would like to now thank Chris Murphy and Bill Gransbury for their enthusiasm and ideas in making this Regional Connection what it is. Without the ideas and energy to see it through, today and the weekend would not have come about.

## Hive of Activity at Market

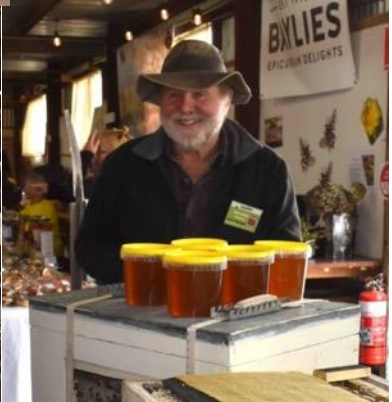

## What next?

The Bush Fire Awareness Panel fairies have given you a prompt with this month's panel.

If you visit the CFS website, you will find a ton of information about preparing yourself, home and property, and some great tips on staying calm in an emergency. Don't forget your Bushfire Survival Plan. See the CFS Factsheet "Preparing your Home for Bushfires".



- Smooth surfaces**  
Paint or refurbish dried exterior timber, repair nooks or crannies where leaves and debris can gather. Design pathways, driveways and lawns around your home to keep a clear area immediately around your home.
- Roofing**  
Well-secured metal roofing is preferable. A tiled roof needs to be well fitted with fire-resistant sarking (fibreglass-based aluminium foil).
- Walls**  
Choose non-flammable wall materials such as brick, mud brick and fibre cement. Vinyl weatherboards, rough timber and other cladding can warp or catch fire. Gaps in external roof and wall cladding need to be sealed.
- Windows, crevices and vents**  
Spark-proof your home with bronze or stainless steel flywire screens on windows and doors, or install fire resistant metal shutters. Cover all wall cavities in fine wire mesh. Enclose areas under decks and floors. Screen vents in the roof space with fine wire mesh.
- Sprinkler system**  
A home bushfire sprinkler system that directs water over the roof, windows, doors and underfloor areas is one of the most effective ways of protecting against radiant heat, direct flame and ember attack. Seek professional advice for design and installation.
- Skylights**  
Install wire-reinforced glass or a thermo plastic cover on skylights as plastic can melt and glass can break in intense heat.
- Property access**  
Gateways should be at least 3 metres wide and there should be clear access with a turnaround point for fire-fighting vehicles.
- Gutters**  
Regularly clean gutters and remove leaves and bark from any areas where they can become trapped.

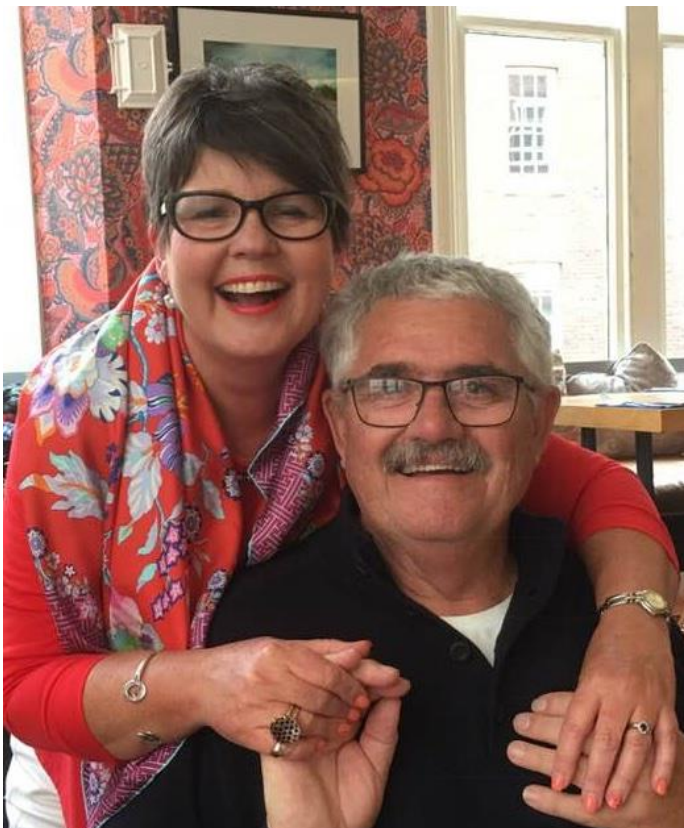

## Fond Farewell

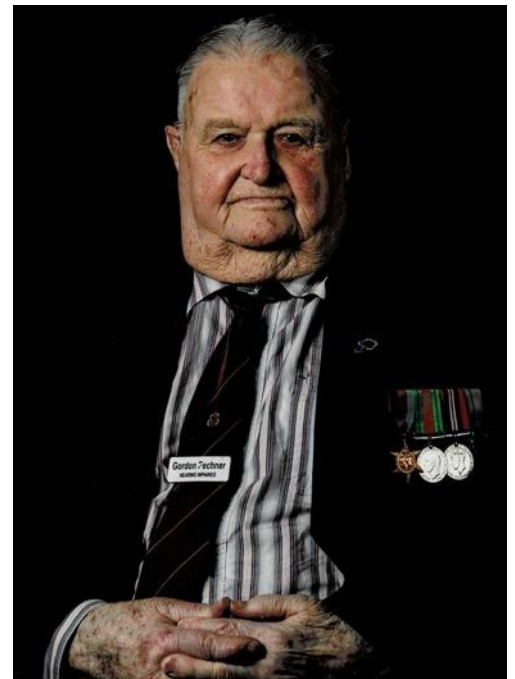
Vale Gordon Fechner

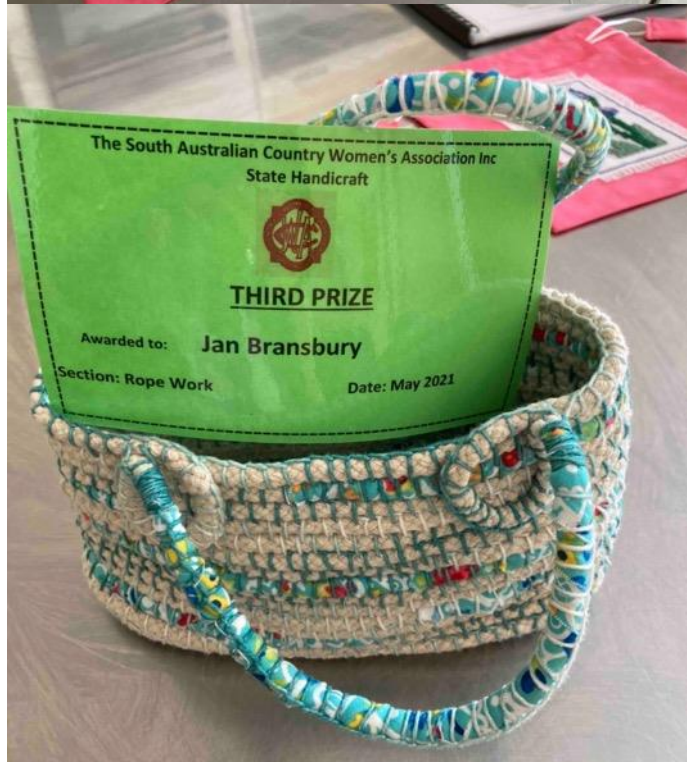
### Market Tea Rooms

## RSL Report

### Branch news



During history Month in May Tim Sutcliffe and Liv Anderson opened the RSL on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> May to the public. They were pleased to receive many visitors to view the Military Museum. A number of visitors expressed interest in joining the RSL.

In June 1916 The RSSIL (Returned Sailors Soldiers & Airmen Imperial League of Australia ) was formed and on April 15<sup>th</sup> 1920 12 Returned servicemen from the area met in The Mount Pleasant Institute to discuss setting up a local branch of The RSSIL. It was formalised on December 13 1929. They set about raising funds to finance a building with many innovative methods to accumulate funds, for example a football match was conducted also a Dinner Dance and donations of the proceeds from a Oats crop.

A building committee was formed in 1954 and at a cost of £4420 pounds 16 Shillings the building was completed by Junkens of the Barossa on Saturday April 21 1956.

The Anzac Day Dawn Service was held the next day at the new building at 156 Melrose Street Mount Pleasant.

In those days the Dawn Service was held on the nearest Sunday to April 25<sup>th</sup>

It wasn't until October 1965 before the RSSIL name was changed to The RSL.

The first President for Mt Pleasant sub branch was Hartley Williams in 1921

On a more personal note, two of our members are suffering health issues, the Committee wish them both a speedy recovery. The RSL are there to support Veterans and their families wherever they can and to that end the sub branch has donated a sum of money to K9 towards the training of a assistance dog. The dogs are trained by The Guide Dogs Association to assist Veterans and is very costly to carry out. Interesting to see that on May 16<sup>th</sup> it was Britain who celebrated their 100 year Anniversary of The British Legion. They are the equivalent of our RSL

77 years ago on Tuesday June 6 1944 The Allies launched Operation Overlord which was the invasion of Normandy. The Allies landed on Beachheads called Juno, Sword, Utah, Omaha and Gold with casualties listed at 10,000 of which 4,414 were confirmed dead.

This massive operation laid the foundation for the eventual surrender of German forces on 7<sup>th</sup> May, 1945.

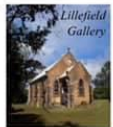
## Lillefield extended into June

All people 50 and over are now eligible to be vaccinated, and will be given the AstraZeneca COVID-19.
