We survived another lockdown - well done us!


Once again, we learned that we can change stuff at a moment's notice. That we can still keep in touch, and that going hard and going early is pretty much our best bet.



Letter to the Editor

We often get feedback (mostly good) and welcome that, and occasionally people talk to us about matters of concern withing the community. As there are a few people who contribute to the newsletter, we are able to cover a few bases and can sometimes point them in the right direction.

Whilst welcoming the obvious advantages of the commencement of the Talunga Park redevelopment, we are also concerned that it be done in a timely matter, that community concerns be taken into account, and that procedures are followed. To that end, we are happy to print Elisabeth's letter regarding her recent situation.

Thanks to everyone who supported us and let us know that we are members of this community, and expressed their disagreement with the closure of the Caravan Park and for all permanent residents to move out. We were encouraged by some members of the community to get Tenancy Advice and following their recommendations we received advise that long-term tenants (more than 5 years) have different Notice to Leave requirements. We passed this on to the relevant parties and the outcome was that long-term tenants (just 2 sites) have the option to stay at Talunga Park. In the interim we will move to a different area of Talunga Park away from the development and major works and move back to a new site when possible. We will also continue to participate in the community.

Precis of the minutes from the recent July Mount Pleasant Progress Inc. General meeting held on Tuesday, 13th July, 2021, at the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed.

Minutes of the previous meeting of May were adopted as there was no meeting held in June.

Business arising / ongoing:

- The Show office building is progressing and ongoing.
- It was resolved by the group that Wendy should go ahead and seek an engineeringreport for the proposed lift in the Hall.
- The MP Tourist pamphlet has been finalised.
- It was noted that Community groups are entitled to at least a 50% discount (or more) on fees for hiring theHall, and it is recommended that groups negotiate with the Council when hiring the hall.
- No further action on the re-furbishing the information bay at the side of the SM Hall at this stage.
- A plaque acknowledging community donations for the installation of trees in the Talunga Park has been finalised.
- The SM Hall stairs have been renewed but there are some issues still not finalised e.g.: carpet, handrail and lighting. Don Barrett is to write to the relevant Council officer about this.
- The historical and safety sign has been affixed to the 707 model train next to the Talunga Park Playground.
- Wooden sculptures ready to be relocated and supported off the ground where appropriate. The MP Men's Shed will negotiate with John Bowd when ready. One of the snake sculptures has been wrapped in bunting flags due to safety hazards.
- Steve Birrell has ordered the replacement Oak trees to replace those that have died or been removed. The cost was \$79 plusGST for each tree. Cost to be covered by the MP Progress Inc.
- There is a new caretaker at Talunga Park. Genevieve to arrange a meeting with she and Wendy asap.


What better way to plow through this latest bout of bad weather and COVID than by heralding a new season with another ShOPportunity event?







It can be overwhelming to think about the various impacts of global ecological overshoot such as climate change, biodiversity loss, and extreme weather events (to name a few). However, thriving lives within the means of our planet are not out of reach.

Upper River Torrens Landcare Group Inc.

What a busy year we have had in 2020-2021. We have worked very hard in bushfire recovery for the second year following the 19/20 Cudlee Creek bushfires.

We have successfully completed another project: 'Restoring Habitat in the Adelaide Hills', supported by WIRES and Landcare Australia Limited.

This project has focused on increasing biodiversity and habitat values by reducing woody weeds, increasing plant diversity through planting and hand seeding and installing nest boxes across approximately 50Ha in the fire scar around Gumeracha.

We have facilitated workshops in seed collecting, nursery work and hosted six planting events. We have enjoyed partnerships with Nuriootpa High School and Seymour College boarders who collected seed, grew tubestock and then came out on site and planted. In summary we met and worked alongside over 170 volunteers and contributed in excess of 600 hours to this project, valued at an amazing \$27k - a huge effort!

We are very proud of our achievements, but recognise that our volunteers and our partners are a significant part of that success. We take this opportunity to thank them all for their contributions and hope that they will continue to be part of our Landcare community in this coming year.

Discussions are happening now to determine what we will be doing in this coming year and we hope to be able to make some announcements soon. Our website is currently being updated, so most of our 'news' is on our Facebook page: 'Upper-River-Torrens-Landcare-Group-Inc.'







The River Murray International Dark Sky Reserve is Australia's first.

It joins an elite group of remarkable dark places around the world. The Reserve includes some 80 kilometres of the magnificent River Murray, small townships, Conservation Parks, farmland, and some of the darkest skies on the planet. At just 90 minutes from the South Australian capital Adelaide, the Reserve is readily accessible to visitors.

Covering more than 3,200 square kilometres, the River Murray International Dark Sky Reserve is known for its dry climate and cloudless skies. Measurements have shown exceptional darkness right across the region, and SQM readings of 21.9 are common.

The Reserve received accreditation from the International Dark-Sky Association (IDA) in October 2019.

The River Murray International Dark Sky Reserve is an initiative of Mid Murray Landcare SA working closely with the Mid-Murray Council and aims to raise awareness of the problems of light pollution and its impact on Australia's unique nocturnal wildlife.




