Here is an update overview Precis of the minutes from the recent August Mount Pleasant Progress Inc. General meeting held on Tuesday, 10<sup>th</sup> August, 2021, at the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed.

Present: John Bowd, Genevieve Hebart, Gareth Saunders,

Steve Birrell, Wendy Harvey, Pete Stephens.

**Apologies:** Chris Hebart, Di Anderson, Don Barrett. **Guests:** Pauline and Mike Williams, Petre Wilde. **Minutes** of the previous meeting of July were adopted.

#### **Business arising / ongoing:**

- The engineering report for the lift has not progressed yet. This will be followed up asap.
- No further action on the information bay.
- The tree plaque has been installed.
- Information received about the finishing of the hall stairs.
   There are still some issues. This will be followed up asap.
- No further action on the information for the Council Website to include information from the MP Progress Inc.
- The replacement trees have been purchased at a greater cost than previously expected \$1032 plus GST. It was resolved to absorb this cost and reimburse the purchaser. Two members to work on the plantings.
- The new Talunga Park caretaker was invited to join the meeting but she did not attend.
- The issue of vacancies has been resolved with the Friends of the old Cromer school house and the Football Club/CFS
- A precis was given of the upgrade of the Caravan Park which is to commence in September and be completed by June next year
- 4 cabins have been purchased from the Nuri Cavan Park and are to be transported to Talunga Park quite soon. The MP Men's Shed will be dismantling the verandas of the 4 purchased cabins and transport the timbers and iron back to the park.
- The AGM will be held next month.

MP Progress Inc. has \$7209.63. Community Dinner has \$9,888.75. SALA has \$619.42.

#### **Project updates:**

Fleece & Fibre: Information was presented on the situation with the Fleece and Fibre Fair and recommended that the fair go ahead on the 21st September within the restrictions of numbers in the Hall, wearing face masks and no sit-down food. Assistance was sought to help set up the hall on the Friday evening and dismantle the set up after the Fair on Saturday afternoon. The door will be manned on the Saturday morning. Three members will be available to assist with set up, and others will be available after the Market.

It was noted that the SALA exhibition is open at the Atrium during August.

The Friends of the Old Cromer Schoolhouse (FOCSH) representatives gave a precis of the situation with the Group. FOCSH formally requested that the group come under the auspices of the MP Progress Association for the purposes of governance and insurance. The group had been given a grant from the Council to repair and upgrade the building and the Tennis Courts. Not all this money has been spent. It was resolved that the FOCSH should be instated as a member of the MP Progress Association, and that a member of the group would attend meetings, and:

A separate cost centre to be established for the management of their finances.

- Minutes of the group meetings to be forwarded to the MP Progress Association.
- Financial requirements to be managed in the usual manner by the MP Progress Inc. treasurer to enable appropriate auditing.
- The Barossa Council to be notified of the situation and asked for a budget to be emailed to the MP Progress Association each month for appropriate tracking.

Information was presented about the *Torrens Valley Football Club* and their present position in relation to the community of Mt Pleasant and the Progress Association. A precis was given of the troubles that the club has gone through in the last 5-6 years and discussed the changes that have had to be made. The football club now is fielding several teams, has 150 members and is going from strength to strength. It was resolved that there would a member from the TVFC would become a member of the MP Progress Association body and that the groups would work together to improve relationships and the facilities at the Oval.

- Concerns were expressed about the lighting at the MP Oval. It was suggested that a formal proposal be put together to the Barossa Council for the replacement of the lighting asap. It was agreed that a letter should be sent to the Football club acknowledging their new commitment to the local community.
- Discussion ensued about the request from a football club member about the installation of the seating which is stored at Talunga Park and the need for something to be done about them as they have been stored for a few years. It was agreed that the MP Progress Association should facilitate a working bee to install these seats and that advice would be given about how this should be achieved.

Discussion also ensued about the current state of the *MP CFS* and its interest in working closely with the MP Progress Association. The CFS is in a healthy state with good membership and well-trained officers. They also have concerns about the state of the oval lighting, especially in relation to medical evacuations and the use of the helicopter. It was agreed that CFS representation will be included on the MP Progress Association.

The MP Men's Shed asked of the meeting that for the following 12 months they be provide the finances (\$900) for the toner to print the MP Beat. After some discussion it was agreed that the MP Progress Association should provide the cost of the toner to the MP Men's shed, a formally incorporated body with insurance, and it is then up to them how they use it.

Discussion ensued about the issue of having a MP town Flag or installing MP town banners in the main street. This will be discussed at a later meeting.

The meeting closed at 9.30pm

The next meeting, encompassing the AGM, is to be held on Tuesday September  $14^{\rm th}$  in the Mt Pleasant Men's Shed commencing at 7pm.

In the last day or so, many of you will have received a letter from Talunga Clinic, outlining the alterations in the provision of services.

I haven't had a good chance to unpick what that means for our community, but I think it's a sign of the times.

Rural and semi-rural practices are run quite differently to the way they were even ten years ago, and it's not confined to our community. Hospitals and clinics are not like shops—we only need them when we're crook. You can't 'shop' locally for health. If you're not sick, you don't need the doctors and the hospital—but if you are—it's a sure bet that you'll have to look further if it's after hours.

There have been many articles written about the lack of doctors who live where they work, and the problem is Australia wide. No-one has come up with an answer yet, but we keep hoping.

# Telstra payphones free for calls around Australia

Telstra has decided that local and national calls to standard fixed line numbers and calls to standard Australian mobiles on Telstra's public payphones are now free.

Last year alone Australians made 11 million calls on payphones, including more than 230,000 calls to vital

services like Triple Zero, so there's no doubt payphones are already often the lifeline that's there when it's needed most.

### 000 - Advanced Mobile Location

On 16 December 2020, the Australian Government announced the commencement of Advanced Mobile Location (AML) technology for the Triple Zero Emergency Call Service.

An AML-enabled smartphone recognises when an emergency call is made to Triple Zero (000 and 112), and if not already activated, activates the telephone's location service functions.


The smartphone assesses the location information available, to calculate the caller's location.

Once the device's location is calculated, the smartphone automatically sends an SMS with the estimated location to the Triple Zero Emergency Call Service. This SMS is sent in the background while the caller speaks with the Emergency Service Organisation, and the caller is not required to do anything to enable the location information to be sent.

If the telephone's location services were switched off at the time the call was initiated, AML will temporarily activate the location service for the duration of the emergency call.

It typically takes 25 seconds or less for the caller's location to be calculated and sent to Triple Zero.

When the emergency call has finished AML will be deactivated. The telephone will not retain a record of the SMS sent, and a caller is not able to retrieve it.

Many of our native birds rely on tree hollows for nests but with far fewer old or dead trees left in our landscape

(especially after fire) nest boxes can help provide essential habitat. It's not just parrots who like a good hollow: pardalotes, owlet nightjars, boobook owls, tree creepers, thornbills, grey-shrike thrushes and robins will all make use of hollows or suitable nest boxes. Some of our bird species will only nest in hollows or nest boxes, while others are a bit more adaptable and will happily use a hollow or nest box but can make do without.







## **Drive My Future**

After results of a Barossa youth survey, it was found that there was not enough cheap/accessible public transport in the Barossa Valley region which meant youth had to drive or be driven to get around. Results also showed 15 per cent of young people aged between 17 and 25 years-of-age had a valid driver's licence, while 53 per cent stated it was not easy to travel within the Barossa region. Of the grants provided by Youth Barossa, 90 per cent are utilised for driving lessons.

A different survey done by the Workforce Development Network indicated that while 92 per cent of young people

have a car, or access to a car for driving lessons, 52 per cent have difficulty achieving the hours required and 74 per cent indicated they would use the volunteer driver program.
