# The Peramangk and the Herbig Tree

The story of German emigrant Friedrich Herbig who lived in a hollowed-out river redgum in Springton is famous in the Barossa Valley. In 1855, the 27-year-old dairy worker set up his home within the 6-metre wide tree that later also housed his bride Caroline and their first two children.

What is less well-known is the story of the indigenous connection to the ancient tree, which is estimated to be up to 500 years old.

On Friday, 10 September, the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board's Aboriginal Engagement Committee (AEC) began discussions to recognise the gum's cultural significance to the area's traditional custodians, the Peramangk people.

The AEC met with some of Friedrich and Caroline's descendants, Peramangk elders and Barossa Council representatives. It was an emotional gathering for all present who heard about the tree's coolamon scars; evidence of Aboriginal people carving wooden dishes out of the tree's bark. The meeting marks the first step in recognising the tree's indigenous heritage and it is hoped that further discussions will lead to signage for the site and native plantings.

## **Community Couch**



The Mount Pleasant Community Association Inc gave a letter of support for a project that Seeds of Hope Suicide Preventon Network were planning for smaller communities within the Barossa

Region. Their grant application was successful and so we as an Association are asking for community support for this project. In their letter of notification they state...*It's our aim that your committee will decide the most appropriate site to place reflection bench. At the same time, we will organise a Barossa mosaic artist to assist you with inviting members of your community to design the mosaic seat for your reflection bench. While the frame will be standard for each town, the mosaic seat will be unique to each of the participating towns. Once your unique mosaic design has been developed, it will be followed by workshops to complete the mosaic.* 

The bench frame and design will be in accordance with an inclusive frame-work ensuring it fits with universal disability, aged and frail regulations. Seeds of Hope will submit this to Barossa Council for their approval along with your suggested location. The bench design and construction is being commissioned to a local steel sculptor Trent Manning and local mosaic artist Kristin Wohlers who have experience in public art and workshops.

Once the bench is completed and installed, we anticipate a community event to provide further education around the concept of a reflection bench and to thank the sponsors and participants.

We welcome the opportunity to meet with the Mt. Pleasant Community Association Incorporated to outline the project and its benefits for Mt. Pleasant, and to let you know more about Seeds of Hope Suicide Prevention Network who are committed to supporting all of our regional Barossa towns and communities. This project offers Seeds of Hope the opportunity to connect with your community during the consultation and workshops. There is also an opportunity for support for further projects within the community.

## **MPPS** Car boot sale




The BCE provides landholders with payments to protect, manage and restore biodiversity in designated areas on their land.

Dean Hooper owns Gumglen, a large grazing property near Quorn in the state's Mid North and part of his property features 5 km of gum-lined creeks and shrublands. Dean was pleased when a survey of the area by the Department confirmed a good diversity of flora and fauna habitat.

"Our bid to the BCE was successful and has provided us funding to protect 655 hectares and carry out works to improve the condition of the vegetation, for soil protection and natural habitat," he said. (see above)

Cadets were given multiple exercises involving structural fires, defensive fire suppression, running grass fire, forestry hose lay drills, pumper trailer draughting. 




