Alice had come from Birdwood - she didn't have the internet - so missed the memo. She utilises the librarians' expertise for keeping in touch with friends and organisations she is involved with, and as she had to wait for a bus to go back to Birdwood, she decided to wait until it reopened at 1.30 and kill some time in the Bakery. Most of the people who came to the library were unaware of the closure, and because you have to actually come up almost to the door to see if lights are on and someone is home, possibly an A Frame on the footpath signifying when the library is open would be a good thing? Paula has one for when the History Room is open and it's really easy to see when she has the room open.

occasional visit from a planner would be useful sometimes, there was nothing. One lady I spoke to at the Market (I hadn't met her before) said that she was actually a member of the Woodside Library (Adelaide Hills Council), as she worked during the week and it was open later so she could call in on the way home from work. I know the Mt Pleasant Library used to be open for an extra hour on Thursday night, but that ceased about a year or so ago.

Everyone without exception, praised the librarians. I know I've relied on their local knowledge for many things in the past (sadly that doesn't translate to a figure on a spreadsheet), and there are many older people I know who they have helped enormously with technical assistance, and utilising the internet, not to mention tourists who are wandering around looking for tourism information. I wonder if one of the services offered could be a Visitor Information Office? Of course – not much use if it's closed on the weekend - but perhaps a call could be put out for volunteers? There are a few people in our district who might want to do it to brush up their office skills, possibly fulfil Centrelink requirements. I'm not sure – and a few people I've asked can't recall that the Library has ever asked for volunteer help maybe that could be a ways of increasing the hours to a session on the weekend?

Having the office space for visiting counsellors could be a good thing, perhaps even a JP service. Mount pleasant people must travel to access so many services that 'town' people enjoy, having a space for professionals to use sporadically could be a great thing for those who find travel difficult, or have to rely on others or the bus service to Modbury.

A reminder that the surveys must be in by 10th March. The form is available for download from the council website, or you can pick up a copy from the Library, and our lovely librarians will send it on for you.

Pleasant History



Hospitals and Halls

During the early 1920s Mount Pleasant community was busy working towards a new institute and a new hospital, after the success of the railway coming to the township towards the end of 1918. Robert Thomson Melrose (RT Melrose) had advocated the community to support this venture before turning his support towards the new institute, and with the death of Henry Arthur Giles in 1921 a large section of land became available for sale, allowing him to suggest that the new institute could be built where it is placed today. There was already in place a recreation area designated behind this area, across the R. Torrens. The purchase of this large parcel of land also gave RT Melrose an opportunity to give a section for the building of a new hospital. And so it came to pass... but have we really come very far in that 100 years?

From an article in the Mount Barker Courier and Onkaparinga and Gumeracha Advertiser (SA: 1880 - 1954), Friday 7 April 1922, page 3, the story seems very familiar...

The residents of the Mount and district are wondering and asking the question—"When are we going to have a public hospital?" That there is the need for one goes without saying, and what has been done in other country centres could also be accomplished here. The district is large and prosperous, and should be able to launch some proposition or scheme to provide a district public hospital in Mount Pleasant. Why not some of our public-spirited residents who have the welfare of their fellow creatures at heart take this matter up, call a meeting, and see what can be done to further such a worthy object.

The district council should be able to take a hand in this scheme, and not sit quietly by and see other districts getting ahead of us by establishing hospitals where patients can be treated. All due honour is given to the Mount Pleasant private hospital, which has served its purpose, and under the skilled matron and her staff inspire the confidence of all who enter there, but the time has come when something, more commodious and more fully equipped, is required to supply a long-felt want in such a large district. We would like to see a combined effort, which would include Tungkillo on the one side, Sanderston on another, Springton and Eden Valley and surroundings all linked up in one comprehensive scheme.

Other places have shown us what can be done. Are we less progressive than they? Or have we got into a rut and going to remain there? We trust some of the powers that be will take this matter up. The members of the local Women's Club are the only ones so far who are trying to help in this direction. They are devoting part of their funds to maintain a cot at the private hospital. This can only be done as long as funds permit, as the club is not by any means a wealthy organisation, but the women are alive to the need which sometimes arises for helping in a practical way cases of sickness. What are the men going to do in this matter? It

should be understood that a public hospital approved by the Government would be subsidised to the extent of £1 10/ for every £1 privately subscribed.



The community did go on to build both the hospital, which opened in July 1924, as private and unfunded by the government, and the Institute, which became the Soldiers' Memorial Hall, opened in November 1927, thanks to a government grant being added to the funds already raised for the project.

And another slice of history about our Library:

Discontinuation of Institute library Service

December 1988

At this time there was a 12 month trial of a Library Service via the Tea Tree Gully Library (negotiated between TTG Library, Mount Pleasant District Council and the Libraries Board of South Australia).

Honorary Librarian Paula Bartsch, was in charge of the Mount Pleasant Library, which was housed in the Soldiers' Memorial Hall.

3,000 books were housed there, and boxes of books were also taken to the Eden Valley Institute on a rotating basis.

In the first year, membership of the library increased from 82 patrons to 218. Regular trips to Tea Tree Gully Library ensured a changeover of stock, and sourcing of special requests. Tea Tree Gully Librarian Jenni Gay, was the professional support officer for this service.

This service was then run by Honorary Librarian Sue Hunt. The agreement between Tea Tree Gully Library was discontinued (in approximately 1995), and a similar arrangement was made with the Adelaide Hills Library, until the township of Mount Pleasant became a part of the Barossa Council with the amalgamation of the Mount Pleasant District Council and the Barossa Council, and the library service was provided by them.



Firefighters seek little honour whilst they're here to hear the praise, But we should pay them homage at the ending of their days, Perhaps in tomorrow's newspapers, the headlines might just say: "Australia – be in mourning! We lost a firefighter today".

- 3. Guest Speaker: Catherine Foreman from Belgravia Leisure/Belgravia Pro.
 Catherine gave an overview of her role within the caravan park and talked about the future changes that will be made. She answered a few questions about the caretaker role and responsibilities for Park management between Belgravia and the Council.
- 4. Minutes of the previous meeting of December were adopted.
- 5. Business arising / ongoing:
 - There has been no further action on the Lift
 - Wendy has followed up with Barossa Council about the handrails in the Hall and has and no response yet.
 - Peter Wilde discussed some of the issues currently with CFS headquarters, COVID and the local units and it is understood that the CFS will water the plants as necessary. It was suggested that given the recent rains watering might not be necessary for some time.
 - We are not sure if Steve Birrell has contacted Ashley about the replacement trees
 - Work is ongoing with the Caravan Park office space. Tenders for the 2 new cabins close on Friday and they will be assessed on Tuesday by a panel including members of the Inc. body. Tenders will then go out for the caravan site works.
 - Peter W reported that the oval seating installation will commence this weekend
 - Graeme will work on banner designs for the next meeting.
 - John Bowd is continuing to repair and paint the animals. It was recommended that he cost the materials required for the snake, so that the Football club can decide on an appropriate donation. It was agreed that proposing a naming competition for primary school students should be postponed until they are all back at school in March.
 - John B and Peter W will start work on the garden strip at the main entrance to the park next month. This will require the installation of a watering system.
 - John B and Peter W have been unable to find the Rex Amber memorial plaque near the flagpole, despite local information suggesting that it is there. A metal detector will be used to try and find it as it appears to be buried.
 - Peter W has talked to the Show society about the Rex Amber Memorial trust which currently has funds

- available. This may be able to be used for issues related to the renovations and a replacement plaque of necessary.
- The gate on the playground will cost about \$250 for materials and Peter is still seeking support for it to be installed.
- Peter W has discovered that the old Pump Jack in the picnic area was brought to the area by Kim Bonython and has some significant local history attached to it. It was suggested that further comprehensive information be sought from Paula Bartsch and a plaque be installed with that information.
- Graeme has been busy with more murals, this time on the SA Water tank with fruit and veg relevant to the Market. He will continue with his painting on the sheds facing Melrose Street
- The train Risk assessment has not been completed
- Old signage has been removed from the information bay at the park. It was noted that Fawcett's have installed a relatively new sign. There was some discussion about local businesses should be prepared to pay for this privilege. It is unknown if Peter W has approached the Football Club about the relevance of the Hughes sign.
- The new initiative proposal for static gym equipment in the park was rejected by Council.

- Pete Stephens gave an overview of the current state of the ToTT which seems to have been saved from disbanding by an enthusiastic community. Given the healthy financial state of the ToTT, the group will be donating \$1000.00 each to the Inc. body, the CFS, Recreate, The Friends of the Hospital and the local animal welfare group.
- It was agreed to defer the meeting about Hall bookings until after the Fringe when Meg Stephens will be more available.

- 7. Councillor Report:
- Don talked about the consultation on the usage of Libraries within the council area and strongly urged members to read the papers and respond.
- 8. Talunga Park:
 - The toilet door has been fixed with an industrial strength catch.
 - Genevieve expressed concern about the lack of drainage for the catering shed. It was suggested that the recent changes in plumbing may not have included the drainage for this and this should be attended asap. 

Palmer Sculpture Biennial



The Palmer Sculpture Biennial opens on Saturday March 19th and will be open to the public on weekends and Wednesday afternoons until Sunday April 17th. Opening hours are as follows Wednesdays 2pm – 5pm Saturday and Sunday 11am – 5:30pm

An exciting selection of sculptures by twenty three outstanding artists will be on display in the Palmer Sculpture Landscape, opening on March 19th. The Landscape is a hilly 400 acre property, and for those who have not been there

before, it is 3.5 km down the Davenport Road, which starts opposite the Hotel at Palmer on the way to Mannum.

Strolling over a rise in a setting that includes escarpments, rocky outcrops and open countryside and suddenly encountering a striking sculpture is an unforgettable experience. In such a setting, works of sculpture have much greater impact than they could achieve in a Gallery.

The artists include six from interstate and one from overseas. Amongst their ranks are leading sculptors with widespread reputations as well as exciting visionary newcomers.

After the opening, the Biennial will be open to the public on weekends and Wednesday afternoons to Sunday April 17th. The Palmer Biennial is a Growing Phenomenon. The first of the Palmer Sculpture Biennials was held in 2004, and since then they have gained an impressive reputation both locally and internationally. The event is now one of the longest, continually running sculpture exhibitions in the history of sculpture in Australia. A growing number of people who have experienced past biennials now make a point of attending each new one. The biennial is run by the artists, and rather than aiming to show a large quantity of works, the emphasis is on quality, artistic merit, and how well they interact with an Australian environment. A high priority is that visitors should be able to engage with both sculpture and place.

Opening Day and Music Event, Sunday March 19^{th} .

Opening day at Palmer is not like most art openings. Admission is free and time is scheduled for visitors to walk around the property and view the works at leisure. The property is open from 11:00, and the opening starts at 1:00. After the opening, the "Verandah music event" will begin at 3:00 and our leading musicians will be performing.

The works in Retelling are accompanied by selected items from private collections and from the collection of the Embroiderers Guild of South Australia.




