


### The Tungkillo Cook Book Celebrating friendship and community





Recently Neil from the Totness Inn has been in and is researching more about the history of the building, as well as the publicans who have owned it.

Margaret (and Kath and Les), having lived in the district for decades have an enormous amount of lived experiences, and are happy to share their knowledge and perhaps shed some light on people they knew in the past, as well as events they have experienced.

#### **Totness Inn Hotel restoration**

March 8th 1918 - Press Release

The masons have commenced the second storey.

Can you imagine a double storey building like the Totness being constructed in 6 months today?

MOUNT PLEASANT.

The building of the railway between Balhannah and Mount Pleasant is now making rapid progress, and it is expected that the opening of the line for traffic will take place in a few months' time. The earthworks are practically completed, the rails are laid to beyond Blumberg, and the line is being ballasted from a fine deposit of stone, into which a line of rails has been run, and a crushing plant and storage bins erected by the contractor. A large staff of men are concentrated here, and indications are not wanting to show that the work towards completing the line is now being pushed on with more vigour than in the past. The old "Totness Inn." in the main street, has been razed to the ground, and the proprietors, J. and A. G. Johnston, Ltd., are erecting a fine new two-storied hotel to take its place. The cost of the building will run into something like £3,000, and when completed it will afford splendid accommodation for visitors, and at the same time will be a great improvement to our street architecture.

All the external walls from top to bottom are a foot thick and constructed of bluestone!

The internal walls are red brick and were made by the local brick maker at the time.

The dining room retains decorative quoins to the front corners and has smaller side windows when compared to the rest of the building, both at ground level and upstairs. There is also the little side entrance door that leads straight into the dining room that follows the same tradition

with a decorative keystone (wedge-shaped stone).

When you look at the original picture from the 1860s the dining room looks awfully like the right side of that building. We think maybe they knocked out the single window and added the double windows in and then had to render the lower section to cover up the modifications.





We do know that Catherine SCHOFIELD, the publican/owner of the hotel from 1869 to 1897 added a large dining/hall onto the building in which she held events for the town.

Could it be that the dining room was kept and the hotel was not "razed to the ground"?

You be the judge!

On the 18th of January 1918 it is claimed the old Totness Inn Hotel was "razed to the ground" and the proprietors, J and A.G. Johnston Ltd. will spend something like three thousand pounds to construct a fine new two storied hotel.

Poetic licence? We think there is still evidence that a part of the hotel dates back well before 1918. Particularly the dining room which we call the great hall.

We could be wrong but we believe once we get renovations underway, we will find out if it has any secrets to share!

#### Vale Diane Anderson

It is with sadness that we have lost one of the stalwarts of Mount Pleasant, with the passing of Diane Anderson. Di was a strong participant within the community for more years than I can recall. I have been a cohort with many events and groups of which Di was an instigator, the first I recall being the 'Cow Drop and Gala Day' which raised much money for the Primary School, where our children attended. For many years Di and I were the custodians for the Mount Pleasant Community Association, which was Incorporated in 1985 and continues today as the auspicing committee for the History Room, Australia Day Breakfast and Street Parade and Party. As times change so do the legalities of organisations and it was with discussions between us that the decision was made for the Community Association to take on the responsibility of these events and organisations so that we would not lose them. She was a strong advocate for the Street Parade and Party particularly. Her attention to detail was sometimes challenging, but was always a reminder of our responsibilities.

Di had an interest in the Torrens Valley Country Education Fund and many organisations within our town can appreciate the input that she made... she was President of the CWA Mount Pleasant branch and was due to receive her 10 year badge for membership to Mount Pleasant Red Cross. She was Treasurer of the Friends of the Mount Pleasant Hospital and a member of the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed, providing tables for the meeting room as well as assisting with events. She had a strong interest in the Mount Pleasant Farmers Market as a volunteer, Board Member and Chairperson.

When I planned the Violet Day High Teas to raise money for the History Room and commemorate the Cheer Up Hut Di became involved with the violet theme and was prompted to purchase teacup and saucer sets and teapots amongst other violet decorated items, as was I. Between us we could serve a High Tea with several tables sharing a purely violet theme. The challenge for us both was to find a Royal Albert Sweet Violets tiered cake plate. She successfully obtained the teapot and I managed a two-tiered cake plate; successes we shared and laughed about.

The Soldiers' Memorial Hall committee was of particular interest and she represented that group on the Mount Pleasant Progress Association. Her list making came to good use when wanting to make note of repairs or additions to this beautiful building.

The Community Dinners at Talunga Park began in order to raise funds for a new commercial kitchen within the Pavilion when the project costs were more than the grant money that had been received. Di's involvement included greeting people as they attended, receiving their dinner payment, as well as urging attendees to purchase raffle tickets for items she had sourced, or organising an auction of the various wines she had collected for the purpose. Her generosity to all the groups with which she was involved was given quietly and often without the knowledge of others.

But this is just some of her community interests and I know there were probably more; all this and yet a working life, for she did hold down a position in Landmark with husband, Trevor, and of course she was committed to her immediate and extended family, helping with all the responsibilities that brings, and regularly travelling to Adelaide to see her grandchildren.

Our thoughts are with Trevor, Stephen, Nikki and their families as they navigate a new road without their beloved wife, mother, and Moo Moo.

### The MP Progress Association needs YOUR help

This is to be connected with the upgrade of the caravan park, and the Progress Association is an active partner in this redevelopment.

We are proud associates with the Men's Shed, convenors of SALA (South Australian Living Artists) and the Fleece and Fibre Fair, and supporters of the Fit and 50's Exercise Group, and Friends of The Old Cromer School and Community Hall.

Our subcommittees oversee the management of the SM Hall and Talunga Park, as well as the Community Dinner.

As you can imagine, we have many ongoing costs such as insurance, and many incidental costs to support all these activities.

  - 82 seats (from Football Park) have now been installed in front of the pavilion at Talunga Park and there are a further 20 to be done. John Bowd has been the main worker on this project.

Peter Wild and John Bowd to continue with this project.

- Graham produced some excellent sketches of trains for the town banners. It was suggested that a list of town events be drawn up and sent to Meg Stephens for some graphic design ideas for Graham to paint. It was though that each banner could be different and be permanent.
- There was a lengthy discussion about the Rex Amber memorial Park and the effort that has been put into restoration of the animals by John Bowd. It was agreed that Peter Wilde should contact the relatives for some ideas about a date for the celebration of the renovations. An afternoon tea or BBQ were suggested for the day. It was also suggested that the Atrium may be a good venue for part of the celebrations.
- The Old Pump Jack to be kept on the agenda for future renovation.
- The Northern gate on the playground has been damaged. This has been referred to the Council.
- There were more positive comments about the murals on the SA water tank
- Graham will begin with the next mural when he returns from an overseas trip.
- A risk assessment of the Train at Talunga Park has been completed and some minor concerns have been noted and will be addressed by the Men's Shed.
- 6. There was a discussion about the need for this group to have some fundraising initiatives to maintain a budget. The only source of money has been the Community Dinner group who are very keen to support expenditure on special community needs.
- 7. Correspondence:
  - A Pamphlet has been received from the Barossa and District Health Advisory Council about a webinar in relation to the planning of the proposed new hospital in Nuriootpa on Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> June at 6pm.

#### 8. Councillor Report.

- Don reported on the issues related to the poor drainage in Melrose Street following the recent heavy rains.
- The Council budget process is in train.
- Don reported on plans for the extensions of the Amy Gillet bikeway and the connection right through to the Clare Valley. It was good to hear that the proposed extension from Birdwood to Mt Pleasant is in stage 1 Investment priorities.
- There is now an APP that has been out together by the Barossa, Light and Gawler History Group which incorporates Barossa Heritage trails.

#### 9. Sub Committee reports:

- Talunga Park: Drainage works in front of the Market/Show Hall have been completed. There has been no further communication from Council in relation to the Grease trap on the catering shed. GH to follow up
- Community Dinner: Genevieve has gained a liquor license for the Community Dinners. There are a number of volunteers who have RSA accreditation.
- SM Hall: Pete S informed the group that following the death of Di Anderson, he, as the deputy chairman has assumed the role of Chairman. Meetings will be held Bimonthly. It is assumed that Merry Stephens will continue as secretary and will send minutes via email. Pete has incurred some costs related to minor maintenance in the Hall. It was recommended that he fill in the appropriate council reimbursement form and submit.
- **SALA**. Jo Dennis will be holding a SALA event during August with 2 other artists.
- Fleece and Fibre fair: This will be held on Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> August in the Show/Market Hall. Genevieve has sent out information to many potential stall holders and has visited a couple of fibre fairs. there have been 18 paid applications so far, adding up to 30 actual stalls. There needs to be a lot of work done after the Farmers Market on the Saturday to set up for the fair and she is calling for support for that time. Genevieve will be asking either the community dinner group or the CWA to provide lunch and afternoon tea on the day. It was noted that the SALA event will be on at the same time in the Atrium.
- **FOCS&CC:** Pauline gave a verbal report. There are now plans for a shed and the old turnstile has been restored by the Men's shed and will be installed.

#### 10. New Business

- The laser cut seating has been purchased and installed in front of the RSL building.
- Wendy reported that there was some additional funding available for updating the town pamphlet and given the short time frames she had gone ahead with some minor changes. Paul Bartsch is applying for a grant for a professional photographer to take photos of the town, which may be useful with the next update of the pamphlet.
- Graham asked if Dennis Rockley could attend this meeting. It was agreed that it would be appropriate.
- It was moved that a small plaque be purchase and placed on the rock at the playground to acknowledge the work done by John Bowd. PW/GS. All in agreement.

- Gareth reported that the Council will be installing bollards in front of the Switch Board near the Men's Shed
- Gareth reported that the Men's shed had been successful with their grant proposal for an avenue of trees in celebration of the Queens Jubilee
- Gareth requested that the Inc. body support the Men's shed printing requirement with a \$900 donation as agreed in September 2021. This was agreed.



#### June Social Night

The June social night saw a small group in attendance for a talk on the origins of The Cheer Up Hut. Many thanks to Margaret and Michael Seager and Kim Yap for the information given to the members.

Michael spoke about how his relative Alexandrine Seager and William Snowden during WW1 in 1914 decided to do something for the returning services and came up with the idea to start a Cheer Up Society, the first Cheer Up Hut was at The Adelaide Railway Station. For further references visit the Adelaide State Library. The Cheer Up Hut closed in 1946.

#### Cheer Up Society ( - 1946)

To

27 April 1946

#### Summary

The South Australian Cheer-Up Society was founded by Alexandrina Seager. Its object was to support the soldiers in the First and Second World Wars as well as to bring them into contact with the 'highest type of womanhood'. During world war one they visited the soldiers at camp before they embarked for the trenches and provided them with supper, concerts and conversation. In the Second World War, they started a Cheer Up Hut near the Adelaide Railway Station that had a hostel and a canteen for every day use and social functions. The hut was financed by donations from several charitable organizations including the Country Women's Association. The society was publicly acknowledged as indicative of women's capacity, support and patriotism.

#### RSL on tour

A reduced attendance was due to the Grey Nomad members taking the opportunity to use the quite time to do some travelling. This included the author and his wife Collette who travelled to Canberra to visit the Australian War Memorial, which is undergoing considerable work including an underground car park. A visit to the Wagga Wagga Airforce Museum was most enlightening and we received a guided tour by serving RAAF service men. We also visited Cowra, the site of a Japanese Internment Camp during WW2. The site was chosen for its isolation and was the scene of a mass breakout of the Japanese

resulting in the deaths of 4 Australian Army personnel and 231 Japanese prisoners.

The breakout of 1,104 Japanese prisoners was met by Private Benjamin Hardy & Private Ralph Jones manning a Vickers No 2 Machine Gun, and who were eventually overwhelmed and killed. The Horsham RSL was also visited as well as The Bendigo RSL Museum, a must place to visit while in Bendigo. While inspecting the collection of Militaria, the author noted that one of the medal displays was of a so-called Rat of Tobruk. My Dad served in the 8th Army and was one of the "Rats". He was captured by the Italian army and was eventually handed over to the Germans where he served out the war doing forced labour in a German Coal mine. One of the medals on the set was of Tobruk Siege 1941 of which the author has managed to obtain a copy.

#### Roof repair



Finally. after much groundwork and discussion with The Barossa Council (TBC), a contractor was located and funds allocated for the reroofing of the Mount Pleasant RSL building which, owned by TBC.

Mick Wegener of Custom Cladding agreed to fast track the task, and during the last week of June work has commenced. Thanks to Rob

Nies for all of



his help. The roof is Australian Colourbond Steel with blanket insulation under the roof, and the ceiling is also insulated. New gutters and down pipes are also fitted.

#### Renovations commence

The RSL lease the building and are responsible for the interior and with the deposit of \$30,000 into our account from The Department of Veterans Affairs work has commenced with renovations. Many thanks to Tony Pasin MP for all his help and guidance. He has stated that his aim in his Electorate is to support all RSL facilities and to bring them up to a modern standard.

Many thanks to Graham Westwood for painting the interior of the building at short notice.

Thank you also to John Bowd with the assistance of the author in relocating the roof access door.

Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA)

#### Description

It is a legal requirement for any person serving or supplying alcohol in a licensed premise to have completed their Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA) training.

This course is suitable for those currently working in or seeking work in the hospitality industry, in a role that involves the sale and supply of liquor. This may include food and beverage attendants at cafes and restaurants, bottle shop staff, or cellar door staff at wineries, breweries and distilleries.

In this course you will learn how to sell or serve alcohol responsibly, how to assist customers to drink within appropriate limits, communication strategies to refuse the supply of alcohol, and more. You will also gain an understanding of the current RSA legislation in South Australia.

On successful completion of the course, you will be issued with a Statement of Attainment.

To ensure that your RSA qualification is valid in South Australia this course will be delivered in person. Both the theory component and assessments will be completed on campus requiring your participation at a TAFE SA location.

mp beat

The minimum age to complete your RSA is 17. You cannot serve or supply alcohol until you are 18.

Under current South Australian legislation your RSA does not have an expiry date. RSA certification requirements differ across states and territories. This course meets the requirements for your RSA in South Australia.

Duration and cost may vary slightly between locations due to facility overheads and assessment capabilities.


