Talunga Park upgrade











Upgrades to Mount Pleasant Caravan Park have commenced with local business <u>Bishop Building</u> currently setting up on site. The popular caravan park will be receiving a \$2.77M upgrade thanks to co-funding of \$817,000 by the <u>SA Government</u>'s Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program and \$1.95M funded by Council.

Improvements will include 2 new cabins (by <u>Tiny Homes SA</u>), 4 repurposed cabins, 24 powered sites, a new camp kitchen, reception office fit-out and landscaping, site sullage, stormwater, drainage and ground levelling work.

Thanks to Mount Pleasant community representatives for their input into the project so far.

RIP Regaie

A much-loved market member has suddenly and sadly passed away after being the victim of a suspected poisoning. Reggie was the 9year-old golden Labrador owned by Talunga Heights Plants stall owners Les and Colleen Modra. She was the most beautiful, gentle, loving dog, very much part of the community and always ready to bring joy to anyone around her, especially at the Mt Pleasant markets. She used to love going caravanning and on fishing trips with Les and Colleen. They will be not be the same without her. She is and will be, much missed.

On the morning of Sunday 31st July, instead of doing her happy morning dance, Reggie was found collapsed at home. After an emergency visit to the Vets, she returned home, still unwell, but had to be taken back on Monday to be admitted. Despite two transfusions she passed away on Wednesday. Reggie was a Guide Dog breeder for RSB (Royal Society for the Blind), who supplied a total of 19 pups in her life, many of them going on to be successful working dogs. Reggie also acted as companion and mentor to other pups in training at the Modra household. Reggie and Les and Collen have been ambassadors for assistance dogs for many years, holding information sessions at many Community groups. Animal poisonings on the rise in Mt Pleasant

Mt Pleasant residents need to be warned that poisonings have occurred in the area around Railway Terrace. In the last 6 months at least 3 dogs that have passed away after emergency veterinary care, from suspected rodent poisoning. This is a slow and painful death and even when caught early may require blood transfusions and other expensive care. These deaths cause heartache for the owners of much loved and well cared for pets who are the innocent victims.

The incorrect use and storage of rodent poison is not only a potential danger to dogs, but also to cats, native birds and animals, chickens and children.

If you suspect anything or have any information to report on this issue, speak up! You can contact Policelink on 131 444 or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000 or Barossa council. The RSPCA Cruelty Complaints Hotline can be reached on 1300 477 722. The more reports that are lodged, the more likely that this will be resolved, and the unnecessary and cruel loss of life will end.

If a neighbouring dog is creating nuisance noise, talk with the neighbour about ways to resolve the issue, or if you aren't comfortable with a face-to-face discussion, write a letter politely letting them know how much of a problem this is for you. If it can't be resolved by neighbourly discussion, then go through the avenues available through the council. It is also useful to keep a log of issues and incidents which may help find the cause/s for the nuisance.

So, please... pet owners, be vigilant and if your pet doesn't seem themself, Veterinary help can be received immediately on 8568 5220.

I am hoping for a change in culture. Although we appear to have had work done in Mt Pleasant recently, a lot has been maintenance, and it seems grudgingly applied. Our town is every bit as important as 'the top end', and so are Springton, Eden Valley, Williamstown, and the other little villages. Working together is what creates good outcomes for all of us. It is no secret that my husband is a councillor for the Barossa, and I am proud of what he has achieved so far. There are a few people he has worked with over many issues who have been really supportive and open to discussion about various issues, and I will be voting for them again. Councillors Dave Haebich and Carla Weise-Smith have worked tirelessly for the council and I admire the efforts they have made for all the Barossa.

I was also really happy to note that the member of the Men's Shed, and Secretary of the Southern Barossa Alliance – Bob Woodbury – would also be throwing his hat in the ring for consideration. I have known Bob and his wife (who was formerly on council) for some time, and have always been impressed by his work ethic and dedication in his working life to education. I will be voting for Bob because I know that he will be a great asset to council, along with Carla and Dave. I hope that you will consider them also.

So – when you vote in October, think about your vote and what it means.

Pleasant History Origins – Street Parades



With the planning underway for the Street Parade and Party in December, I though it appropriate to come up with some ideas for people wanting to participate in the Parade in 2022. It seems that decorative parades are something that has been welcomed in the past and the following snippets give some idea of the skill of some people to put ideas together. It is a pity we don't have many photographs of these as they would be of interest. These parades were held on Anzac Day as part of a fundraising effort for the Hospital.

Mount Barker Courier and Onkaparinga and Gumeracha Advertiser (SA: 1880 - 1954), Friday 2 May 1930, page 5 The annual effort of the Mount Pleasant District Hospital was held on the showgrounds on Anzac Day and was, as usual, a great success. A new feature this year was a procession of decorated motor cars at 11 a.m., which paraded through the main street, headed by the Marananga Brass Band. The cars were preceded by a giraffe and keeper (Mr. Cox) who, though unaccustomed to so much publicity, kept well on the crown



of the road and led the procession in the way it should go. The school children filled two trollies as Red Cross nurses, and a party at the Arctic regions, all looking very much at home around the "Pole." Next came the "way backs," or Mount Pleasant 50 years ago, followed by a "Wurlie" and family of native children. The cars were judged by Mesdames Vigar and A. W. Lillecrapp, who awarded first and second prizes to the Arctic regions and Red Cross nurses, with special prizes to the giraffe (Messrs. Dewell), "Waybacks" (Miss G. Shanks and party), and Mr. Terrell's "Wurlie." A program of athletic sports was arranged by Mr. V. C. Cooke, and carried out on the grounds by a committee. Inside the large hall the ladies had arranged and were busily engaged at well-laden stalls, most of which were relieved of the goods during the day.

The Mount Barker Courier and Onkaparinga and Gumeracha Advertiser (SA: 1880 - 1954) Friday 1 May 1931 - Page 3

... Headed by the Mitcham Brass Band the procession soon after 11 a.m. fell into line at the top end of the main Street and marched to the lower end, then turning by way of the avenue to the show grounds where the cars were judged. The children's display was quite a novelty, the first prize being awarded to Ken Westphalan for decorated boat; the second went to Ian Herriott's poppy bicycle. Decorated doll's prams were shown by Suzzanne Davey, Nancy O'Dea, Theyer Giles, and Elva Dean, all of whom were given an award. The first prize for decorated cars was awarded; "The Swan" (Mr. E. Tapscott); second to the "Football Car" (thrown and blue); special prize went to "The Daisy" car (Mr. A. Reeks); best school decorated motor lorry (Japanese design) was awarded Mount Pleasant. Other than school for best decoration the prize was bestowed for "Hawaiian Scene". For the most humorous jazz band, first. (Mr. A. Reeks, second, Mount Pleasant unemployed. conductor): sustained character on horseback, A. Staples. The judges were Mesdames Lillicrapp, Mullins, and Bruce Forrest, whose Task was by no means a sinecure as all the decorated cars were a picture and each was worthy of mention. Much of the initiative and success was due to the ability of Mrs.Westphalen, who undertook much of the decorative work and spared neither time nor talent, which was amply awarded by the displays represented in the procession. ...

Totness Tales

Neil Wilson, who together with his wife Steph and daughter Georgia have taken on the mammoth task of refurbishing the Totness Inn, was the special guest at the Community Dinner on 28th August.

An engaging speaker, Neil spoke about how they came to buy the business, and touched on some of their plans for the future of the beautiful old building.

It is their intention to retain the licence, so that it continues unbroken. They have also retained the gambling licence – because – who knows what will happen?

At this stage they plan to use some of the rooms for themselves and live there, establish a licenced café in what was the old Ladies Lounge, but more recently housed the poker machines. As they have 11 bedrooms, accommodation will hopefully be on the cards, but they still have to sort the layout, which has suffered a little bit from a few ad hoc additions and alterations over the years.

Restoring, the building and re-instating some of the period features that have been removed, has so far been a labour of love – and a LOT of elbow grease. Luckily not all of the period features were taken out, and Neil and his family have also

found some interesting mementos including manv old newspapers, which they hope to have on view. They are currently sourcing period furniture from the later 1800's to the 1920's, and already have quite a few gorgeous vintage pieces. It will certainly have eclectic décor, and they are hoping that it will be a warm and friendly place, that will be a natural gathering place for our town. They plan to host



events and would like to encourage people to use it for weddings and family events, and possibly live music. It would also be a great place for a function centre.

The Wilsons are only the sixth owners in the pub's history, which has seen around 33 publicans since 1860. The Johnson Brewery owned if for over a hundred years.

Re-establishing the Bottle-O is a priority, as this is clearly something the town wants, and it will bring in some much-needed revenue whilst the restoration is happening. Hopefully in around three months – and possibly with the Liquor Legends group. The third of August would have been an important milestone, as the front bar was opened in 1918, but I don't think he'll wait until next August to do it.

Neil has an interest in cars and would also like to host

Cars and Coffee' events, as well as 'Trash and Treasure' mornings and Sunday breakfasts. They are hoping these will not only bring more visitors to town, but possibly encourage more people to call it home, as quite a few families have done over the last few years.

He is also wondering if a micro-brewery might be on the cards – to compliment a beer garden – once the back area has been cleared of some redundant outbuildings. This potentially could accommodate a stage for live music.

Neil has not had any incidents with ghosts, although Steph woke him up one night and said she thought he'd gone upstairs as she had heard heavy footfalls on the stairs. Nothing eventuated from this – but Neil admitted to not being happy about fumbling around in the dark looking for a potential intruder. And there was the time that a floor rug apparently rolled itself back up....

There are many stories from locals about things they or others have seen, including seeing a cat staring into a corner for no apparent reason, woman in a blue dress, and an old bloke enjoying a beer who is apparently quite grumpy and has been known to throw furniture about. Former manager Elizabeth Clark says her grandchildren said they saw a child in a nightdress when they stayed there once.

Neil is happy if people would like to volunteer to help – although he's not expecting a rush of offers!

It was great to hear what has been happening behind closed doors, and many at the dinner were curious as to what their pans were – hopefully Neil has answered enough for

Dark Sky

It all started with silos being transformed into works of art, then the water towers got painted, and now we're seeing artwork on a pipeline! This 50-metre mural adorns the Mannum to Adelaide Pipeline in Apamurra approximately four kilometres from the township of Palmer. The section of the pipeline on Randell Road just east of the Milendella Road intersection was painted by South Australian artist Jack Fran. In five days, he converted the pipeline's concrete exterior into a celebration of the region being recognised as a dark sky reserve. With a darkness measurement of 21.97, the region is perfect for experiencing the night sky regardless of whether you're an astronomer or a budding stargazer like those two children with telescopes in the artwork. Jack has also featured the Australian Pelican who often calls the River Murray home.

The pipeline mural is free for everyone to enjoy. Just over an hour's drive from Adelaide will get you there easily. It is hoped that this latest attraction would bring an even greater number of visitors to the region.

Since 1955, the Mannum to Adelaide Pipeline has served the needs of Adelaide residents by supplying water to the metropolitan network. It was the first major pipeline to be built from the river. Its total length is 87 kilometres, so I wonder if there are plans to paint more sections in the future? Guess we'll have to wait and see.



Kitchen and refurbishment update



Battle of Long Tan



In August of 1966 The Battle of Long Tan took place in a rubber plantation near Long Tan in Phuroc Tuy Province, South Vietnam during the Vietnam War.

The action was fought between Viet Cong and People's Army of Vietnam with Units of the 1st Australian.

During the battle, 27 Australians died and 25 were wounded one later died of wounds. This was the highest number of

Australians killed in any one engagement during the Vietnam War.

The Viet Cong had at least 245 dead and about 350 wounded. Australian forces captured 3 Viet Cong. The Australian force only numbered 108 men with the battle raging for 3 hours. Next Social Night and Meeting






