As Active Citizens, we owe it to ourselves to be across the many challenges that face us given global uncertainty. For me, the desire for change is a process where we keep informed by adopting awareness of what is happening on our patch and a willingness to engage in conversations. It is readily acknowledged that there many individuals organisations working towards inclusive solutions that aspire to deliver social justice within our community.

Volunteering

Our quality of life can be related to the levels of volunteering across our community. We are now facing a crisis as we recognise the excellent work as a generation moves to enjoy a well-earned retirement from tireless community work. We need to dig deep to engage recent retirees who have a wealth of experiences to contribute. We need to seek new ways of enabling all members of the community to enjoy the fruits of a job well done.

Environment

Department of Environment and Water statistics indicate that only 3% of original vegetation remains within the

Adelaide and Mt. Lofty Ranges, and approximately 12% remains in the Barossa Council area, and of that, 5% can be found on our roadsides and road reserves. It is critical that the impacts of changing climate: temperature extremes; increased storm events and lower rainfall are mitigated by our actions to maintain air, water, and soil quality.

Housing

We are now amid a housing crisis brought about through economic uncertainty and inadequate public housing provision. Given our general affluence as a significant trading nation we are slow to respond to the harsh reality of families living in cars, couch surfing, sleeping rough and tenting outdoors. We need to go beyond a passive acceptance to develop processes and resources e.g.: creative solutions such as emergency housing, affordable rentals, repurposed building stocks, incentives to release investment, Airbnb housing and upgraded caravan parks. A crisis signals action for the short term and not a committee meeting series and a commitment to a budget in the long term.

Rex Kitchener Amber

(Rex shared his middle name with Lord Kitchener, whose face was on enlistment posters for WW1)

Many of you will have noticed quite a bit of movement at Talunga Park – not only the Caravan Park redevelopment, but also the restoration of the Amber Animals. John Bowd, assisted by Peter Wilde and occasionally members of the Men's Shed, has carefully removed and restored, then replaced these wonderful wooden sculptures, enjoyed by a couple of generations of kids and adults. Most would know about the sculptures, but not as many would know the story behind Rex's desire to give joy to children.

Below is an article, printed in the Stock journal when Rex was beginning his sculpting journey:

Monsters in the park

A giant yabby more than 5 metres long is slowly coming to life in a yard at Mt Pleasant.

The man responsible for its creation is log sculptor and retired Birdwood dairy farmer Rex Amber

Rex took up sculpting as a form of relaxation when he was on the land.

He found more time to devote to his hobby when he gave up milking Friesians and moved up the road to live.

His creations, some recognisable, some imaginary, are dotted throughout the Adelaide Hills.

There are a whale, giant grasshopper, crocodile and snake in the grounds of the

Birdwood Primary School, and a friendly, looking witchetty grub in the town's main street.

Mt Pleasant's Talunga Park sports a giant tree snake, turtle, crocodile and an unusual animal with six legs, udder and stirrups.

The Giant yabby being hewn atop a huge pile of woodchips in Rex's backyard is to be the centrepiece for a swagman's convention in Mt Pleasant in November.

"The convention is to perpetuate the memory of one of Australia's vanishing characters," Rex said.

"And the yabby is appropriate as a converging point because that's what the Jolly Swagman was after at the billabong when he was challenged by the troopers

Rex describes himself as a "creative inventor".

His medium is solid redgum logs, and his only tool an axe.

The animals he carves are determined by the shape and size of each log.

He insists that when he looks at a log in a paddock he sees a snake, whale or crocodile or something along those lines - not just a hunk of wood.

"The challenge is to look at a log, get it home in the back of the car or on a trailer, and be able to do something with it," he said. "What I'm trying to do now is make a different animal each time - and crocodiles are easy."

Rex discovered, his talent for log sculpting years ago when Birdwood Primary School needed a children's seat to go around a tree in the grounds.

The cost of buying one was too high, so someone suggested Rex supply logs to use as a seat.

Not content with doing just that, he joined a few logs together and carved them into a snake to curl around the bottom of the tree.

It was a success, Rex caught the sculpting bug, and has not stopped since.

All sapwood is chipped off the logs before an animal begins to take shape, so that only hardwood is used.

Rex also makes his animals large and heavy to withstand attacks by vandals.

Rex's dream is to set up a large children's fun park called Iggle Farm, somewhere in the district for locals and as an attraction for tourists. It would be something of a fantasy playground, with log animals to climb on as well as more conventional things like boat pond and maze.

"Most of the animals I've carved so far are part of my playground concept," he said.

"I want to bring playgrounds alive for young children and the wider community as well, using materials that are available on any farm.

"Children like these log animals because they excite their imaginations.

"They seem to prefer them to the run-of-the-mill, stereotyped modern play-ground equipment that can not only be dangerous but costs a lot of money."

I think Rex was ahead of his time regarding playgrounds. It seems that he would approve most strongly the proliferation of 'Nature Playgrounds – notably Palmer and Mt Torrens – that encouraged children to use their imaginations, to give them a taste of what it might have been like a few generations ago, when we all climbed trees and our play was unstructured. And yes, sometimes we scraped knees and fell over, but the joy in building the perfect fort, of imagining ourselves "somewhere else", not relying on electronics or the latest TV programme, but living in the moment.

To that end, the Mt Pleasant Progress Association, together with members of the extended Amber family would like to extend the invitation to our community – past and present – to join with them and celebrating this remarkable man and his labour of love for children.

Pleasant History Subject

Sometimes it takes an enquiry from someone to prompt some dedicated research. A month or so ago I was asked about the THOMSON family, and I did some investigations to the land titles, to try to clarify just what Sections they owned. The property we know as 'Lilybank', according to The Quiet Waters By, by Reg Butler is on Section 416 Hd Jutland, and was owned by John Thomson, who came from Fifeshire in Scotland. He arrived in South Australia in 1839 with his wife Janet, and a young family. At first, he was a shoemaker in Adelaide, then moved out to the Woodside area before venturing to Mount Pleasant.

Before 1858 the land titles can be difficult to clarify due to ownership from an earlier date, without the official documentation. I do know that Henry Giles and his wife Mary Ann, owned sections around Section 416 and I was told that John Thomson arrived in the area around 1855, so it needs further investigation at State Records to truly determine the establishment of the region.

A son, David Thomson, went to the Victorian goldfields in 1852, with future brothers-in-law, Priestley Hillam and James Maitland. Presumably they made a sum of money as they both established properties in the region of Mount Pleasant. Another son, Robert Thomson, became manager of Caurnamont Station on the Murray Flats before taking up land himself on the River Murray.

But things often fall into place when you least expect it and I did discover that Francis Thomson, son of John, owned Section 411 and 412 Hd Jutland from 1868; these sections being opposite Lilybank across the Angas Valley Road. After the death of Francis Thomson in 1927 they were purchased by William Ellis Rollond, and Robert Thomson Melrose.

According to The Quiet Waters By... Thomsons farmed near Mt Pleasant, on a property they called 'Lilybank' on the Harrison Creek watershed along the Cookes Hill Road (now known as Angas Valley road). The homestead's door and window lintels and chimneys were built of Scottish Aberdeen granite brought out as sailing ship ballast ... Currently the new owner of this property is renovating the various buildings, including Lilybank Cottage, which was established by Effie Thomson after World War 1. Effie was a daughter of Francis Thomson and served as an AIF nursing sister attached to No. 5C Transport Company where she served for some months on the troopship Borda, between Australia and the United Kingdom, before being later attached to military hospitals in England.

- Progress of the Caravan Park redevelopment was noted
- Rex Amber animal sculpture restoration celebrations have been organised and a pamphlet has been distributed to relevant parties
- The Rex Amber sculpture from Tungkillo has been collected and left with John Bowd to assess for repair. This table was in the design of a ghost moth and was donated by Rex to the Tungkillo community to recognise the naming of the town from the Peramangk name for the ghost moth grub "Tainkila" A plaque is to be installed recognising the donation from the Tungkillo Progress Association.
- Genevieve, Wendy and John met with a community member regarding concerns re the playgrounds and had a look at both areas. There are a number of issues that need to be addressed and it was recommended that a report on safety issue be sent to the Council.
