



I watched with interest as Federal Attorney General Mark Dreyfuss introduced a Bill to alter the Constitution allowing for a First Nations Voice to Parliament. During WOMADelaide, I listened to a Planet Talk about this. The speakers were Sally Scales (Chair of the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yangkunytjatjara Executive Board), Dale Agius -Inaugural S.A. Commissioner for First Nations Voice, and Joint Chair (with Professor Megan Davis) of the Uluru Dialogue committee - Patricia Anderson AO. Afterwards I was lucky enough to have a word with Aunty Pat and what a warm, gracious and impressive person she was. Congratulations to the state Government for passing the Voice to Parliament in South Australia, and to the inaugural Chair, Dale Agius. We wish them the best for these important first steps. At WOMADelaide a couple of years ago - during COVID - I was lucky enough to not only listen to Midnight Oil play not once, but twice, the second being the Makarrata concert. During the Planet Talk, 'makarrata' was explained as the coming together after conflict to resolve issues. Even though there has been no war - there have been issues - and without Voice, you can't have Treaty - and after Treaty comes Truthtelling. I look forward to the next few years as a coming of age for our country.



Pleasant History Our Hall

Our beautiful Soldiers' Memorial Hall is nearly 100 years old... and that would usually suggest that there will be a celebration for this milestone. But currently the Hall committee comprises very few members... just 4 or 5 people who have a strong interest in maintaining and caring for this beautiful building. Under the auspice of the Mount Pleasant Progress Association, the Hall committee is a sub-committee and reports to the Association any concerns they may have with maintenance and improvements.

The Hall committee is desperate for new members who wish to attend bi-monthly meetings, and give support for the care of this facility. Once community owned, it was given to the then Mount Pleasant District Council as the upkeep had become too much for a few in the community to manage. This meant that the District Council maintained and improved the building, which was done, with an Advisory Committee of 8 or 9 members, and a caretaker in place, who was also the librarian. With the amalgamation to The Barossa Council the committee has changed from an Advisory Committee to a Section 41 Committee and then to a sub-committee of the Progress Association who has the responsibility for advising on the upkeep of Talunga Park and the Hall. This scenario, however, does not mean that the necessary upkeep is actually achieved, as that is the responsibility of Council. The Barossa Council relinquished the caretaker position and so the local community no longer has knowledge of the usage of the Hall, or someone who simply walks the grounds to notice any anomalies that may occur. Unfortunately, the money saved in this decision does not appear to be placed elsewhere for the betterment of the Hall.

If you have any interest in this beauty in our town, then the Progress Association and Hall Committee would love to have your input.

Can we make a celebration for 100 years anything like that which was held for the opening... ?

In November 1926 the foundation stone for the Hall was laid and dedicated with a celebration which included a fete to continue the fundraising for defraying the cost of the building, with the official opening of the complete Hall in July 1927. It took some years, though, to decide just where the Hall should be situated, with the final vote was taken in 1922, and there were two committees involved - the Institute committee which was responsible for the then Institute now known as Townsend House, and the Soldiers' Memorial Hall committee which was planning a new build, as the former had become too small for its needs.

From the Mount Barker Courier of 7 July 1922

At a conjoint meeting of the Institute Committee and the Soldiers' Memorial Hall committee held in the Institute on Saturday, June 12, 1922, to decide on a site for the above hall, the following members were present; Mr. J. C. Herriot (presiding), Messrs..F. F. Thomson, J. L. Maitland, Chas. Harding, J.P., W. Jensen, J. Rich, Rev. Adams, Dr. R. C. Godfrey, F. Dewell, Hon. R. T. Melrose, G. T. Melrose, Rev. J. A. Ford, Thomas Corrigan, Giles, V. Cooke, and Miss J. Talbot. It was proposed by Mr. Ben Giles and seconded by Mr. F. Thomson that this meeting agree to ballot for a site on which to build a Soldiers' Memorial Hall.

Moved by Mr. Ben Giles and seconded by Dr. K. C. Godfrey, "That this meeting pledges itself to recommend to their respective committees the acceptance of the block of land known as the Hon. R. T. Melrose's (situate at Talunga Park) as the site on which to build the Soldiers' Memorial Hall"

The result of the ballot was as follows: For Hon. R. T. Melrose's block, 10 votes; for the block known, as, Mr. L. McBean's, 6 votes.

Residents of Mount Pleasant and the surrounding locality, gathered in large numbers on Saturday afternoon in the main street of the township for the foundation-stone ceremony of the soldiers' memorial hall, which was performed by the Governor Sir Tom Bridges), His Excellency was accompanied by Lady Bridges, Miss Alvilde Bridges, and the Hons. Sir Lancelot Stirling and R. T. Melrose, M.L.C.'s (members for the district), and the party was received by a guard of honour comprising local returned soldiers, in charge of Lieut R. S. Davey.

The hall has been under construction for about three months, and is expected to be completed about February. The block of land was presented by Mr. Melrose. A brick structure, the facade is of two stories. The frontage is 62 feet, and the depth 42 feet, the first floor comprising the entrance hall, with a reading room on one side and a library on the other. Above there will be a billiard room and a clubroom. The assembly hall at the rear, which gives the building a T shape, is commodious, having a length of 82 feet, including a 20 feet stage, and a width of 40 feet. A supper room is to be located beneath the stage. The architects are Messrs. English, Soward, and Jackman, and the contractors, Messrs. F. Goodenough and Son. The committee comprises Messrs. Dewel, Cooke, W. Ross Smith (hon. treasurer), Davey, J. C. Herriott, J. L. Maitland. and Melrose. The last named has shown his munificence by a further gift of £1,000 toward the building fund. Among other donations are the following: £300 from an anonymous donor: Mr. A. Melrose, £250; Mesdames H. H. Wigg. £150: A. McDiarmid, £100: M. Hillam, £50; Messrs. Dcwel, £50: W. T. Young, £45: J. Burns. £30; K. McBean, £25; through Mrs. R. Anderson, £5 5/.

Another newspaper report that a fete was conducted in the recreation reserve at the rear of the building. The stalls and the conveners were:— Sweets and children, Mrs. A. Harris; cake. Mesdames A. H. Shanks and P. T. Gehling; jumble, Mesdames J. L. Maitland and Hope Murray; vegetables, Mesdames L. McBean and C. Wellsman; cool drinks, Messrs. H. C. Verrall and A. Harris: Ice cream. Mrs. T. Smith and Miss A. Talbot; strawberries and cream, Mesdames R. S. Davey and V. Tapscott, Misses M. Wells man and J. McBean. Afternoon tea was provided in a marquee, in charge of Mrs M. Porter. In the evening a dance was held.



The official opening of the building occurred on July 16th 1927. From Mount Barker Courier

The opening of the above hall took place last Saturday, July 16th in the presence of a large number of people from all parts of the district. The weather was cold and threatening, but fortunately rain held off until late in the evening. The members of the committee with Mr. Frank Dewell as president, V. C. Cooke, secretary, and W. Ross Smith, treasurer, had all worked hard and had given much of their time, but had great reason to feel proud and gratified at the result of their combined efforts which had been so generously supported by the residents of the Mount and district. It was fitting that Mr. Frank Dewell was asked to perform the opening ceremony, for since the foundation stone was laid by His Excellency (Sir Tom Bridges) last November, Mr. Dewell and the secretary, Mr. V. C Cooke, have not spared themselves and took a great interest to advance the object in view, which as all could see had culminated in the erection of a hall worthy of the district and a lasting memorial to the soldiers who had gone to the War from this town and surroundings, many of whom did not return. The structure is two-storey, and from the entrance, which will be known as the Hall of Dedication, the library is on one side of the reading room on the other. On the top floor is the billiard room, and boys' club room, the main hall is at the back and the supper room leads off and is under the stage, which is finished off with handsome vieux rose poplin curtain, trimmed with old gold. Before the door was opened the chairman, secretary and treasurer outlined the various stages of progress. Since the first meeting in 1914, the sum of £5,166 19/6 had passed through the treasurer's books, the expenditure on the building had been £6,081 8/3, which left a debt of £914 8/9 still on the building. ... Mr. Dewell was presented with a silver key, suitably inscribed, and was asked to open the door. The public were then admitted to all parts of the

building, and were pleased with the appearance of the lofty main hall with its beautiful ceiling and white walls, the rest of the building also met with the general approval of all....

Again afternoon tea was served, and festivities continued with a cake stall, sweets stall, and a jumble stall. A concert was held in the evening, with the new hall packed with locals and visitors enjoying the festivities of the Adelaide Lyric Concert Company. Following this was a dance to finish the day.

The proceeds from concert and dance amounted to £71 1/4, sale of chairs £52, donations £26, jumble stall £26 4/-, cakes £20, afternoon tea £20 13/4, sweets £13 11/-.

Some years later, in 1929, the actual Memorial was placed in the Hall of Dedication... From the Observer 16 November 1929

A dedication service was held in the Soldiers' Memorial Hall, Mount Pleasant, last Sunday. On the platform were the president of the committee (Mr. J. Heriot), Mr. Hannaford, M.P., Brigadier-General S. Price Weir, and Chaplain-General the Rev. W. Floyd Shannon.

There was a large attendance of returned soldiers and the public, the hall being crowded.

The dedicatory prayer in memory of the fallen was said by the Rev. W. Floyd Shannon, after which Brigadier-General S. Price Weir unveiled a memorial tablet, an honour roll, and enlarged photographs of 13 fallen soldiers.

The roll was presented by Mr. R. T. Melrose. It is of beaten copper mounted on a polished blackwood frame, the names of those killed being engraved on brass plates. The enlarged photos of the fallen soldiers are enclosed in a polished frame six feet by four feet six inches, the names being:—M. Bax, A. Bax, P. Boomer, R. Geisler, F. Hicks, E. Jensen, G. Lintern, V. Pike, T. Whitelaw, W. Polden, J. H. Daniel, J. Deane and W. H. Cook.

The dedicatory tablet over the doorway bears the following inscription:—"Great War, 1914-1919. This hall is dedicated to the memory of those who made the supreme sacrifice. Their name liveth for evermore."

It can be seen by the photographs of the day that there was a large crowd at all events. Even the original building committee had quite a number of members, so much more than we see on our Hall committee today. Will there be much interest if we plan a celebration of 100 years for the Hall?



Origins of Anzac



April 25th of each year is to Commemorate the landing of Anzac troops at GABA TEPE, later known as Anzac Cove under the command of Lt General William Birdwood. The British 29th Division landed at Cape Helles under the leadership of General Sir Ian Hamilton

The landings took place on April 25th 1915 and with mounting casualties due to the Turkish defence, sickness and inedible food all troops were withdrawn by January 9th 1916.

Allied Casualties totalling 300,000 with 56,707 killed with the British troops losing the most at 31,389.

The Ottoman Empire casualties were 255,268 with 56,643 killed. The township of Birdwood is named after Lt Birdwood replacing the original name of Blumberg.

On 3 March 2023, the SA State Emergency Service, alongside Minister for Emergency Services Joe Szakacs MP, held the first of many presentations to recognise the response efforts during the River Murray flood. This was to say thank you to SASES employees who were heavily involved in the coordination and response to the flood.

One of the most significant floods in South Australia's history, this photo shows only a portion of the mammoth response effort.

From August 2022 to February 2023 (over 180 days), we had over 1,400 people involved in response to the flood, equalling over 130,000 personnel hours worked—that's over 14 year's worth of hours! This included:

- over 369,500 sandbags distributed to communities
- 17 community meetings and multiple street corner meetings
- approx. 1,600 levee assessments
- 5.31km of DefenCell Flood Barrier deployed
- air and ground observations

A big thank you to everyone who supported us, keeping River Murray communities prepared and safe. We also thank <u>NRMA</u> <u>Insurance</u> as our Principal Sponsor for their support over the River Murray flood including the outstanding efforts from their team who volunteered to assist with the deployment of DefenCell barriers at Mannum. Further presentations will be held in future.

Attention has now turned to recovery and many of these agencies will continue to be involved to support communities during this time.

Ready, Set, Progress

Playgroup SA has partnered with the Office for the Early Years (Department of Education) to provide free development checks for children aged 12 months to 4 years. The checks provide an important opportunity to monitor your child's development, identify any concerns and celebrate milestones. A <u>development</u> check helps to monitor whether a child is meeting the milestones for their age (such as dressing or talking). Please note this is <u>not</u> a health check.

What does the check assess?

The development check looks at the following areas: communication, movement, problem solving and personal-social skills.

Why do a development check?

When concerns about a child's development are identified early and appropriate support is given, children have the best chance of developing the skills they need for playing, interacting and learning. This gives them the best chance of reaching their potential.

How will you assess my child?

We will be using the Ages and Stages Questionnaires (ASQ-3) to monitor your child's developmental milestones. This questionnaire is parent friendly and will be sent home to be completed over a 1-week period.

What do I need to do?

- Attend Springton Playgroup on Wednesday the 5th of April 2023
- Sign a consent form and take home the questionnaire provided
- Complete the questionnaire at home
- Attend playgroup with the completed questionnaire on Wednesday the 12th of April 2023 (the Child Development Assessor will be able to help you answer any questions if you were not able to complete it).
- Follow through with any referrals or recommendations, if needed.

To ensure the program helps parents and children, the University of Adelaide will also be evaluating this trial and if you would like to, you can provide feedback.


