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Winds of change

Our Mums used to say "don't pull a face, or the wind will change and you'll be stuck like that!" 'Experts' in the media tell us that once people have made their minds up about an issue, it's very difficult to get them to reconsider. Sometimes it only takes age and experience, self-awareness, or seeing or experiencing hardship. Sometimes it takes (quoting Pink Floyd) "a short, sharp shock."

For those who have long-held opinions, the only piece of advice I can give, is think more deeply. Examine long-held beliefs and think about your own experiences. Are you basing these on what you have seen, heard. or read from reasoned and trusted resources, or have you just made assumptions without knowing the full story? If people are called up for jury duty, they are asked to put aside any preconceived assumptions, so that they can give an unbiased answer when deciding the innocence or guilt of a defendant – after hearing all the evidence in the case before them. Losing those preconceptions, some held for a lifetime, is pretty difficult. We've all struggled with them. I am totally biased regarding some 'types' of people, and I am really trying to work on it, but am willing to admit there may be some things I can't 'fix'. So, maybe I should just shut my mouth. (!)

The opportunity is coming up for us as a nation to right some wrongs. It is more important than we can possibly know right now. I remember when Kevin Rudd said 'sorry'. I was driving to work when he started, and was a few minutes late because I sat in the car park to listen to the rest of his speech. I had spoken with some people in my office regarding the significance of this, and one person was convinced there would be a slew of law suits, that members of the Stolen Generation would run to lawyers and demand vast amounts of compensation. No matter how hard I tried, I couldn't convince her, that to First Nations people, 'sorry' meant something completely different. Saying sorry was the right thing to do. No, it couldn't fix what had happened, and it didn't mean that we were apologising for personally causing the pain, but that we were all human, and we empathised and cared, and that if we had our time over again, that would NEVER have happened. That's all they wanted.

Our next step as a nation, is acknowledging our First Nations peoples as the traditional custodians of these lands, of the water, of the seas. That while it was in their hands, this nation was cared for and nurtured, and they still have deep connections. Asking them how they would like their issues to be considered is such a small thing for non-indigenous people to provide, but it's the right thing to do. It will not destroy our democracy – but make it stronger. It will not make us a more racist country – but there's a good chance it will make it less racist. And it will be a piece of history that we can be proud to say we were a part of – that finally – we ARE one, because acknowledging our First Nations – the longest, surviving indigenous culture on earth – is the right thing

I railed against the sheer impracticality of this proposal across consecutive Council workshops and meetings, and even proposed a common-sense and workable compromise (dogs must be on a leash), but to no avail.

Council Consultation

The Barossa Council is planning for future growth and preservation of the region's character, and is wanting the community to have their say. Community feedback will help inform a draft Growth and Infrastructure Investment Strategy, as well as proposed amendments to the Planning and Design Code. People can give feedback in a range of ways, including online surveys, in person at one of pop-ups across the region or by making representation to Elected Members at two community forums. Consultation will run from 1 May to 30 June.

Council representatives were at the Market on the 27th May to hear from locals, and many were happy to step up and have their say, showing local knowledge was invaluable to making sure council understood Mount Pleasant's unique position, and just how far business has progressed and expanded in the last five years, with several projects still underway now.

Mt Pleasant Library news Temporary closure

The Barossa Council has approved the closure of Nuriootpa Library on June 14, 15 and 16 and the Mount Pleasant Library on June 22 and 23 for infrastructure improvements.



Council previously approved the purchase of new shelving and furniture for the Mount Pleasant Library. The proposed dates were selected to minimise disruption of library programs and events at each site.

Other Barossa libraries will remain open for customer use on those dates. *Leader 17 May*

Talunga Park

According to The Leader on 17th May, "the Mount Pleasant Caravan Park upgrades are progressing well, with four cabins relocated from Nuriootpa Tourist Park this month. (These were first placed at Talunga Park during August 2021.)

The Barossa Council received \$817,286 in State Government grant funding in 2021 to go with a further \$1,957,394 contributed

by Council for this project. In addition to the four relocated cabins that can sleep four people and come with a basic kitchenette and ensuite, two new cabins are also being built. Construction on the new cabins began in March, with external cladding and



tiling in the bathrooms underway. The shared camp kitchen structure (right) was also built in April with the kitchen fit-out the next step in the process.

This means that everything Yvonne creates is made with (almost, if not!) 100% recycled materials and tools, and / or materials and tools found within our natural environment.

Popular at Recreate are her hand woven / crocheted bowls made from pre loved bedding sheets, t-shirts, shoe laces, plastics, wire, electrical cable...

Art does not need to cost you the earth!

You never know what you might find at Recreate, and that's one of the joys of visiting us!

We have a wide variety of vintage wares.

From kitchen utensils to tools of yesteryear to cameras to leather bags and clutches...We love learning about items of the past, and in turn passing on the stories and history of a vintage piece. Renewing. Reinventing. Recycling. Reviving.

Did you know? Glass used for food and beverage containers is different from other household glass. Other glass, such as drinking glasses, ovenware, windscreen glass and mirrors are heat-treated or have additives in them, meaning they need to be processed differently to be recycled. It is best to drop these items off at your local Council depot OR local salvage and save.

Recreate also accepts these types of glass to be recycled and repurposed. Whenever we receive unframed mirrors, we put them aside for a local maker duo that use them for making hanging plant boxes. They will even incorporate chipped mirrors into their work.

We haven't received many windscreens over the years, but I'm sure our amazing volunteers and makers could think of a creative way of upcycling them!

As the five headed into the hot zone, the wind suddenly switched direction, engulfing the Tanker in flames and killing all five members. This unfortunate incident is what inspired JJ Edmondson to bring about International Firefighters' Day, to commemorate the lives lost and dedicated fire fighters who risk their lives every day to save life and property.

Breast Screen



BreastScreen SA is coming to Highbury in the Tea Tree Gully region from early June to late August 2023 to provide free breast cancer screening (breast X-rays) to healthy women from the age of 40, especially those aged 50 to 74 years, helping to detect breast changes that are too small to feel. Each year nearly 100,000 South Australian women book their screening mammogram at BreastScreen SA, but this represents only 59% of women who are eligible. A woman's risk of developing breast cancer increases with age (1 in 9 South Australian women will be diagnosed before she turns 75). By finding breast cancer early, more lives can be saved and treatments can be simplified.

Did you know that women aged 50 to 74 can have FREE breast cancer screening? Women aged 40-49 and 75 years or older can also attend for a free breast screen, but are encouraged to speak with their doctor when deciding if a breast screen is right for them. Your Say Barossa

The Barossa Council is planning for future growth and preservation of the region's rural character and wants the community's input.

The Growth and Infrastructure Investment Strategy will consider what areas are best suited to accommodate residential, commercial and industrial growth, as well as what infrastructure is needed to support growth.

Rural character and heritage are important considerations in how the region can grow. As such Council has undertaken a review of State Government planning rules that apply across the Barossa Character Preservation District. The review identified potential changes to the Barossa Character Preservation District planning rules to better conserve the Barossa's rural character whilst allowing for regional growth, including consideration of the Concordia growth area.

Discussion papers have been prepared for the Growth and Infrastructure Investment Strategy and the Barossa Character Preservation District Review and highlight key considerations for both.

Council now wants to know what is important to the community. Where do you think growth (eg. housing, industry) should go? What infrastructure is needed to support growth? And where does character and heritage need to be protected and how? Do you have any feedback on the discussion papers?
