The bottom line

Listening to ABC radio this morning I heard that the McLaren Vale and Districts War Memorial Hospital had closed. Probably practical, you would think, as there are three large hospitals within twenty minutes of the town, that provide excellent services. Emergency, Maternity, Orthopaedics, Oncology - you name it. The MV hospital was set up by the community in 1945 (although there was movement to set one up a long time before that), and has benefitted from continuing public support and generous bequests, but now the board has recommended closure, as it hasn't made an operating profit in years and everything needs upgrading. The best option seems to be a merger with Kalyra, a group that manages the Nursing Home next door. One of the issues is that on the generous five acre plot is a popular doctors 'surgery and an Op Shop. So, what happens to them? Many of our small rural hospitals were established by their communities, I would hazard a guess and say most of them run at a loss, and so many have closed down in the last twenty years. Their communities have fought the good fight, but ultimately, we all know who wins here.

The thing is, should health make a profit? What about education, power, water, policing? I'm not sure that public services should be driven by profits. It's about people. It's about providing essential services. (SA Power networks (infrastructure) was sold and Cheung Kong Infrastructure Holdings Limited and Power Assets Holdings Limited own 51%.)

Our community – through the Friends of the Mt Pleasant Hospital has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars over the years, members have worked hard, and we have been lucky enough to be supported by a general practice and excellent doctors over that time – but many practices are struggling. Rising costs and the fact that Medicare rebates haven't increased significantly for some time mean that in order to continue, some strong measure have to be taken. For those of us with private cover or reasonable incomes, it's not great, but manageable. For those on fixed incomes, pensions or unemployed, it is a huge impost, and experts warn us that the consequences of people making the decision to NOT visit the doctor over health concerns will cost us all in the longer term.

So, what's to be done? Why can't the health sector and communities get more creative? What more can our hospital do for us? While our hospital is still here, we should be fighting for it. We've lost emergency services here - we still have doctors who provide a daytime service (as I found out when I needed it recently), but if there's a serious incident that requires immediate attention - what happens? Gumeracha has had limited services reinstated after a large public outcry - but how long will that last? When community assets are sold or taken over, it seems that even though - with the best of intentions - safeguards are put in to protect the asset for a specified time - maybe that has been factored in? So how long will it take for the community to forget? Do you think there is a magic number? Even when Mt Pleasant Council ceased to exist, a moratorium was put on the sale of council assets for twenty five years. How many people have remembered that? Will they care?

We still have a hospital - fight for it!

(And I need to add - I received the best of care both from our doctors, their staff, the ambulance drivers and the people at Lyell McEwin Hospital. Thank you to them all.)

Dark and stormy weather

We've had a few of those recently – trees down, strong winds, power outages, and freezing nights. Well, it IS winter after all. The fire has been cranked up, the air conditioner going flat out, and blankets our constant companions even when watching the telly (how about the Ashes?!). Of course, in our house the blankets stay – even in summer.

It's been pretty brutal for so many people this winter as rents have increased, electricity bills are going up, and many people are struggling to find a place to live. Homelessness is reaching record levels.

A local community initiative – the Community Pantry (based in Birdwood and supported by many local groups) – has experienced a huge increase in demand for their services. You will see collection points in the Mt Pleasant Post Office and Mt Pleasant Bakery – please donate what you can. Items of greatest use are non-perishables such as sugar, flour, rice, pasta and tinned goods. Our wonderful community has always been generous to the many groups which provide for those in need – on many levels – we thank you in anticipation.

The Walking Trails Support Group launches New Barossa Walks App

Launch of new Barossa Walks app

The Walking Trails Support Group was established in 1999 and since then, members of the group have developed about 230 km of walking tracks, largely in the Flinders Ranges and Barossa region. The small group works voluntarily maintaining the trails and providing interpretation. Notes are available for walkers with details about the landscape they are walking through including information about geology, Aboriginal history, flora and fauna.

WTSG volunteers have developed a free App – Barossa Country Walks – featuring 10 walks in the Barossa region which were established by the Royal Geographical Society and WTSG members, and part of the Society's guidebook 'Exploring the Barossa'. The walks are in Conservations Parks (Barossa Goldfields, Hale, Sandy Creek and Warren), on Barossa Council land (Altona, Little Kaiserstuhl and Steingarten) and in Forestry SA reserves (Jenkins Scrub, Mt Crawford, Mt Pleasant and Warren). As well as walking notes and location maps, the App has GPS crumb-trails and audible GPS-triggered alerts for points of interest – views, geosites, flora, fauna and cultural sites. Bird lists and plant lists are also provided with photographs to help with identification.

The free App can be downloaded for iOS and Android devices by simply searching "Barossa Country walks" or scanning the QR code above.

NAIDOC Week

NAIDOC week will be celebrated this year from the 2nd to the 9th of July. Here are some things you may not know about why NAIDOC week is celebrated.

1920 – 1930: Before the 1920s, Aboriginal rights groups boycotted Australia Day (26 January) in protest against the status and treatment of Indigenous Australians. By the 1920s, they were increasingly aware that the broader Australian public were largely ignorant of the boycotts. If the movement were to make progress, it would need to be active. Several organisations emerged to fill this role, particularly the Australian Aborigines Progressive Association (AAPA) in 1924 and the Australian Aborigines League (AAL) in 1932. Their efforts were largely overlooked, and due to police harassment, the AAPA abandoned their work in 1927.

In 1935, William Cooper, founder of the AAL, drafted a petition to send to King George V, asking for special Aboriginal electorates in Federal Parliament. The Australian Government believed that the petition fell outside its constitutional responsibilities.

1938: On Australia Day, 1938, protestors marched through the streets of Sydney, followed by a congress attended by over a thousand people. One of the first major civil rights gatherings in the world, it was known as the Day of Mourning.

Following the congress, a deputation led by William Cooper presented Prime Minister Joseph Lyons with a proposed national policy for Aboriginal people. This was again rejected because the Government did not hold constitutional powers in relation to Aboriginal people.

After the Day of Mourning, there was a growing feeling that it should be a regular event. In 1939 William Cooper wrote to the National Missionary Council of Australia to seek their assistance in supporting and promoting an annual event.

1940 – 1955: From 1940 until 1955, the Day of Mourning was held annually on the Sunday before Australia Day and was known as Aborigines Day. In 1955 Aborigines Day was shifted to the first Sunday in July after it was decided the day should become not simply a protest day but also a celebration of Aboriginal culture.

1956 – 1990: Major Aboriginal organisations, state and federal governments, all supported the formation of, the National Aborigines Day Observance Committee (NADOC). At the same time, the second Sunday in July became a day of remembrance for Aboriginal people and their heritage.

In 1972, the Department of Aboriginal Affairs was formed, as a major outcome of the 1967 referendum.

In 1974, the NADOC committee was composed entirely of Aboriginal members for the first time. The following year, it was decided that the event should cover a week, from the first to second Sunday in July.

In 1984, NADOC asked that National Aborigines Day be made a national public holiday, to help celebrate and recognise the rich cultural history that makes Australia unique. While this has not happened, other groups have echoed the call.

1991 – Present: With a growing awareness of the distinct cultural histories of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, NADOC was expanded to recognise Torres Strait Islander people and culture. The committee then became known as the National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee (NAIDOC). This new name has become the title for the whole week, not just the day.

The National NAIDOC Committee respectfully acknowledges the now defunct and inaccurate term 'Aborigines', whilst retaining the term in our title due to historic use by our Elders in establishing this week of commemoration in 1938. Pleasant History Visit to Cambrai Agricultural Museum



The day was wet and miserable but I had organised to visit the Cambrai Museum to deliver some agricultural books that had been handed to the History Room, but which we decided would be better suited to hand on to Cambrai. I had sent an enquiry asking if they may be interested, and fortuitously they were open the following weekend, so I was able to promptly pass the box of books and Stock Journals on. Hopefully there was something in the box that was new to their collection. Rose Laucke and her offsiders were very welcoming and we enjoyed a chat about archiving and the challengers there are in keeping small collections alive and accessible. I was very interested in their collection of family histories, and just how accessible they were to visitors.



I had not been to the Cambrai Museum before, so was very interested in their collection. The set-up is very well done and I enjoyed perusing the various cabinets and displays within the building, and then the cottage which had been rebuilt there and the sheds, including one constructed from mallee roots. I did



wonder about the little tin shed, but soon discovered that this was actually a prison cell, complete with occupant. I'm sure he must have had a connection to the 'prisoner' who seems to be lurking within the former Police Station grounds at Mount Pleasant.



The Cambrai Museum is open the first Sunday of each month, except January, so if you are looking to take the children somewhere interesting, I would suggest that they will find something of interest at this museum. We also opted to visit the Cambrai Red Cross shop... and I had visited there before. It gave me an opportunity to deliver some items of books and clothing that I had been wanting to pass on... and the shop is an interesting one to peruse... you never know what you can find.

Donations

During the previous month or two the History Room has been gifted several boxes of books, papers and even a very large photograph. We are currently looking at these with a view to either include in our own collection or find a new home for them. I have found it interesting to read some minutes of meetings from the 1990s for the Soldiers' Memorial Hall, and intend to check if we already have these in our folders. There was mention of repairs to the stage curtains, which are again under discussion for repairs or replacement, and with the 100th anniversary in 1926/1927 it is timely to find this snippet of information.

Our team at the History Room are happy to receive any items pertaining to the history of the region... and this means from the 20th century as well as earlier, and even in the 21st century. It doesn't have to be 50 to 100 years old to be useful to us. If you have photographs from events around the region from the 1990s or the 1960s, or other times, we would love to have copies, or the originals. Before you throw anything out, please think of us, and let us make the decision of where things should be kept.












Council has agreed to add the watering of the Red Oaks at Talunga Park to the water truck program and will look into the upkeep of the Amber Animals. Also up for consideration will be some mulching around the area which will perhaps lower the use of water especially if placed around hard wear areas. Progress would also like interpretive signage adjacent to the Rex Amber sculptures, at both Southern and Northern ends of the exhibit to be added and council has asked for an idea as to what would be needed, for consideration. After some recent heavy rains which made the road in front of the Market almost dangerous to navigate on foot, council has inspected it and will be rectifying it as soon as possible. The upgrade to the oval lighting has been added to the 2023/24 draft budget.

Windamere Horse Haven

Over the ten years Windamere Horse Haven has rescued neglected horses, the plight of two mares recently signed over to the facility at Mt. Torrens, were described by the attending veterinarian as "the worst case of



horse emaciation I have seen in my extensive career."

Property owner and Windamere Association president David Mews said "Windamere Horse Haven operates as a not-for-profit charity which aims to save horses destined for a lonely, miserable future by giving them a second chance at life through rehabilitation and re-education in a caring environment with a view to finding a new forever home

"Typically, upon arrival at Windamere, a horse is given a complete veterinary examination, blood tests are undertaken, and a comprehensive dental inspection carried out. From the results of such procedures, appropriate food and supplementary dietary needs are arranged. Generally, these horses have not had any attention paid to the hooves for long periods of time and often reconstructive hoof care adds further to the vet, dental, food and medicinal needs of these wonderful animals."

Following a request from a member of the public in regional South Australia, Windamere agreed to take in five horses after a local identity died. The Iron Knob community were very helpful in placing seven of his twelve horses. With euthanasia the only option remaining, Windamere stepped in for the remaining five horses. "Transport costs were about to cripple our resources so we put out a call for public assistance," Mews said. "The response to our 'givenow.com.au/windamere' was fantastic and

Facebook followers also stepped up to the plate." These horses arrived on the same weekend as the mares. Windamere Horse Haven welcomes public contact regarding



suspected abuse or neglect of horses, working closely with the RSPCA to resolve reported cases, often re-homing horses preemptive to legal proceedings or when horse owners are unable to continue their care of their animal.

Quality of care is paramount to Windamere. Mews said "Each horse that comes to us costs over \$600 before we can produce a care plan. Ongoing feed, vet, dental, farrier and operational expenses have recently come under considerable strain but these horses deserve the best so that is what we provide.

In the ten years we have been rescuing horses we have successfully re-homed over 200; including two donkeys."

"Covid has severely impacted on our funding with some regular sponsors unable to continue their support. We continue to look for sponsors, particularly from corporations, to allow us to provide quality care to horses in need." Mews said.

Firefighting grants

Round Two of the Farm Firefighting Units (FFU) grants is now open, with priority given to those who were unsuccessful in Round On, or who did not apply.

Items eligible for reimbursement include:

- Tank with a minimum water capacity of 400L and with fill point for water.
- Water pump.
- Hose and/or branch.
- Fire Fighting Unit (i.e. compact fire units or slip on skid units). Fire rated personal protective clothing (PPC) (gloves, jackets, pants, boots and P 2or above).
- Masks.
- First aid kits (specifically with burns kit included).
- Fire blankets.
- UHF/CB radios
- Amber rotating beacon.
- Heat shields.

Proposed items must be new. not second-hand and be fit for purpose.

Applications will be assessed in line with defined selection criteria such as value for money, geographic location, risk, and existing capability.

Once an application is approved. Successful applicants must ensure their FFU is registered with the CFS to receive reimbursement.

Round Two will close Friday, 4 August at. 5:00pm and applicants will be informed of outcomes by September 1, 2023.
