Despite this, one in five

Australians experience major discrimination based on their age, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, ability or origin. As a country, we scored 61 out of 100 in the Inclusive Australia Community Index. It's time to start turning things around. It happens here – if you see it, hear it, experience it – Call It Out.

Reflecting community

The planning phase of a special community-led project in the Barossa region to address the stigma associated with suicide is almost complete as the next step begins on the Reflection Sofa project.

A collaboration between major sponsor Black Dog Ride Australia, Seeds of Hope Suicide Prevention Network and The Barossa Council, it's hoped the sofas will be a symbol of hope and will help to break down society's stigma around the topic.

Talented locals have already started on mosaics ready to cover three benches, one destined for Angaston near the Barossa Old Rose Repository, another for Lyndoch's Village Green and a third over the footbridge behind the Mount Pleasant Soldiers' Memorial Hall.

All have serene views overlooking water running through nearby creeks which, adds to the sentiment behind the project. People can reflect and connect – that's the message, You can reflect on how you are feeling, reflect on where you are in the environment and connect with yourself and others. It was a fantastic turn out with many more than we were expecting. The pictures don't show all the people who came to help, and some were unable to make it on the day, but will come along for future workshops.

Kristin Wohlers, renowned Mosaic Artist has been employed by Seeds of Hope to help us on this journey, and her expertise is evident in the confident way she has guided us through the design process, and worked with complete novices to make sure we can do a half reasonable job. (I have to say I was worse than useless, and my apologies to Virginia who stoically supported me as I messed up our bit!)

Kristin had drawn the design on a backing, then a mesh was put over the top. The drawing can be easily seen underneath, and the mosaic pieces are then stuck to the mesh. Almost all of the participants had had no experience of this type of art, and there were varying degrees of success! The workshops will continue for 12 weeks - or less if the artwork is completed earlier. We are thankful to Recreate for allowing us workshop space, and urge people to visit during August, as this place is also the venue for their SALA exhibition.

TOTT celebrates 25 years

Review from TASA:

TASA Review for TOTT's 25yr Celebration below: From the venue – the Mount Pleasant Soldiers Memorial Hall – to the bottomless tea and coffee service, the attractive display of memorabilia and the half-time raffles and silent auctions, this oldstyle variety show was a splendid illustration of the worth and work of a community theatre group.

And then there was the show itself. The audience was well entertained by the presentation of songs and skits from the group's 25 years' worth of productions. In that time, they have performed fifty shows, many of them presented, as this one was, in dinner theatre form.

Director Gordon Combes and MD Heath Gladigau devised the progamme thoughtfully, and had its elements linked by a fetching narration. Steve Farrer was a wonderfully understated narrator, relating a number of historical and amusing incidents from the group's past, and delivering his lines with authenticity and the authority of having been there for all of the events.

The cast represented a balance of experience, even including some who had been in the group's first production. The big ensemble songs were well coordinated and were full of life and enthusiasm. Good examples were Do You Hear The People Sing, Hooked On A Feeling and In The Navy, all well led by the strong baritone of Heath Gladigau. Some small ensemble songs of particular note were the quintet singing Chattanooga Cho Choo and the sextet singing Men In Tights. Solo voices were well showcased, too. Eden Lane was especially impressive. She was strong, clear and expressive in My Favourite Things, Kate Farrer was entertaining and powerful in Old Maid In A Garret and Gwendolyn Van Zwol combined apparent Celtic naivete and sweetness with the grimness of the text in Rickety Tickety Tin.

TOTT stalwart Kate Farrer had directed the skits which were interspersed with the songs. They effectively illustrated the variety of works that the group has performed over time. Of them Tim Lane's recitation Colorectal Surgeon drew lots of laughs from the audience as did the small group sketch Portia's B&B.

Top Of The Torrens Theatre Group have thrived since their inception. That's a credit to a series of committed individuals over the years. All power to them for powering on in this way. Long may they continue.

Colleen and Les - Educating Astrid

During June, Colleen and Les Modra visited the SACWA branch and spoke to us about their work with 'assistance dogs'. Previously, training dogs to help had been almost exclusively for those with little or no sight, but time and experience have shown that these remarkable creatures are able to help people in so many more ways. They now work under the banner of 'See Differently - Assistance Dogs'

About ten years ago, Les and Colleen came into contact with Merrawyn Williams (who some might remember owned Williams' of Lobethal), who had been training dogs for some time. Impressed with what she was doing, they decided to apply to help. Their first dog, Heidi, became a guide dog for a mature-age law student. Heidi was so smart she soon found him shortcuts around the Uni campus. Their next dog, Erin, was withdrawn from advanced training because of indicision about how to go around an obstacle and became a "furever dog" for a family that lived near the beach. Then came Rusty who became a guide dog for a gentleman profoundly that totally blind and was Then was Reggie who was special and so was chosen by the RSB to be one of their breeding dogs. After two litters (10 and 9 pups) she retired and became Les and Colleen's much loved "furever dog". Reggie was hugely popular at the Farmers Market and wider community, who were all very upset when Reggie died from poisoning last year, a senseless act. At this time Les and Colleen also had a 1 year old retriever, Remi, who could no longer stay because of the poisoning. Remi became an assistance dog to a very withdrawn autistic teenager, and has helped wonderfully. Their current dog is Astrid. Les and Colleen are called Puppy Educators.

Working dogs not only work with people who are unsighted, but it has been found that children with Autism respond extremely well to having an assistance dog, and those with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), can also benefit greatly. Dogs are often able to provide comfort when they sense their person is starting to experience stress or help avoid something that may cause distress.

These dogs are also used for Search and Rescue and for those who have hearing issues. They are also amazingly able to detect early signs of cancer.

When a dog is working, they will wear a special vest and or harness, and should not be distracted. If you see a person with an assistance dog, please talk to the person and don't interact with the dog. Dogs learn to walk on a lead, toilet on command and have a working life of around 8-10 years. Once they have completed 'work' they are usually kept by their families, and then become a pet for the last few years of their lives. It costs around \$30,000 to breed and train a dog, and care is taken to ensure a diverse gene pool.

Dogs are with their initial Puppy Educator for 18 months, but this depends upon the animal. Then they enter 6 months of specialised training, as guide, PTSD or autism dog. Some dogs may change to another career with a different organisation such as a hearing dog. Some dogs may be withdrawn if not suited to a career, and these are rehomed with the public,

and there is a long waiting list. The RSB pays for all food and veterinary costs while in training, with the Puppy **Educators** being required to take dogs to training sessions about twice a month. If you think you have what it takes to be a Puppy Educator, have chat with

We now have the caravan on site at Recreate and it fits under the carport roof! Once SALA is up and running, we'll start work on it.



Gawler Repair Café

Date: Sat 19 August 2023Time: 9.30am-12.00pm

 Location: Evanston Gardens Community Centre, 65 Angle Vale Rd, Evanston Gardens

Bookings: No bookings required, just drop in

Repair Cafes provide a free meeting space where community members can work with skilled volunteers to repair items that would otherwise go to waste. Our volunteers have skills in mending (clothing & textiles), electrical repairs (small appliances), costume jewellery repairs, general repairs (mechanical/woodwork) and simple bike repairs. Services are provided free of charge but customers can choose to make a small donation to support the service if they wish.

Most attendees get to see a repairer straight away but coffee, tea and cake are provided to keep you occupied if you do need to wait.

How it all Works

- The repair café philosophy is to teach people how to undertake the repair themselves if possible. For that reason we ask that attendees sit with the repairer while the repair is taking place, so they can observe the process and have a go at it themselves.
- All repairs are conducted at the discretion of the repairer; if the repairer isn't comfortable with conducting the repair, it won't be undertaken. Items must be in a clean condition for repairers to examine them, textile items must be washed before you bring them in.
- There are some items it isn't possible to repair at the café e.g. microwave ovens and TVs retain charge and it is dangerous to attempt to repair them. Anything containing dangerous substances such as asbestos and lead is also out. We are unable to do repairs that require larger "shed" type equipment e.g. welding. And some items are too tricky to take apart and put back together again, like toasters, sound systems, and of course computers.
- Repairers will fix one item per attendee. If there is time, they may be able to look at a second item for you, but this will depend on whether others are waiting.
- For clothing and textiles we do mending/repairs not alterations. E.g. we can help you darn a hole in a jumper, or repair a rip in a pair of trousers. If you have items of clothing

that need to be taken up or in, that is a job for a professional alterations service. We are also unable to make items of clothing.

- Our repairers are skilled volunteers. They will try their best to fix your item but there are no guarantees.

Round Two of the Farm Firefighting Units (FFU) grants is now open, with priority given to those who were unsuccessful in Round On, or who did not apply.



Items eligible for reimbursement include:

- Tank with a minimum water capacity of 400L and with fill point for water.
- Water pump.
- Hose and/or branch.
- Fire Fighting Unit (i.e. compact fire units or slip on skid units). Fire rated personal protective clothing (PPC) (gloves, jackets, pants, boots and P 2or above).
- Masks
- First aid kits (specifically with burns kit included).
- Fire blankets.
- UHF/CB radios
- Amber rotating beacon.
- Heat shields.

Proposed items must be new. not second-hand and be fit for purpose.

Applications will be assessed in line with defined selection criteria such as value for money, geographic location, risk, and existing capability.

Once an application is approved. Successful applicants must ensure their FFU is registered with the CFS to receive reimbursement.

Round Two will close Friday, 4 August at. 5:00pm and applicants will be informed of outcomes by September 1, 2023.
