The RSL began life as the Returned and Services League of Australia. The league was formed in 1916 to create a unified approach to repatriation facilities and medical services for those returning from WW1.

A meeting of State representatives on 6th June, resolved to form the Returned Sailors and Soldiers Imperial League of Australia.

It was their intention to lobby for better benefits, medical treatment and welfare of veterans and serving members of our Defence Force. The League soon became, and remains, the nation's largest ex-service organisation.

RSL was formed on 16th June 1916.

Formerly called

- 1916 Returned Sailors and Soldiers Imperial League of Australia
- 1940 Returned Sailors, Soldiers and Airmen Imperial League of Australia
- 1965 Returned Services League of Australia

The League objectives remain relatively unchanged.

- Vision: To help Australia's Veterans and Defence families enjoy better opportunities in all aspects of their lives.
- Mission: To provide on behalf of Australia's Veterans and Defence families, national advocacy, supportive and coordinated national programs and activities, more funding and optimised management of the RSL brand.

Isebell has not been to well and has been storing lome for a few days has they one hiffling up into the though to live. & Jound orning Sebell



2 well my bear boy we are still getting some warm Sun and i hope you are getting on all right and hope to here from you i warm what has happened to you to here it 120 from i do hope and trust you will be able to come again i really do not no what to you but hope you are in good sprites and have a good kurse to look after your if you have a nice goil to hurse will not mind it so much you you mag God bless and keep you through so with all of our best wishes and love to you and love from Mother and Tather and hope to here more news of your before long, i was glad you all injoyed that cake because this this made it. Gill said she call you her boy has she has several boys she sends to so you her for it and don't mind must thank you giving the dot to you mates has long as some foor boy gets them so i now close with much love to you from mother ++++++ God bless you



Trials and tribulations of the Tungkillo region in the early years Part 1

Earthquakes and storms:

Going back through early residents in the area, from their personal records there has been noted that a severe storm came through on the night of 8th June 1874 waking up residents with a loud noise, one of the original residents named Henry Hobbs was woken from his sleep and investigated this loud noise and found on his return from looking around, he noticed that his couch was covered in around 600 bricks, a very lucky escape for his family. (Possibly from a slight earthquake). November of 1913, Tungkillo had a week of fierce winds causing much damage, then on 2 December of the same year, a week of extremely high temperatures followed with a record temperature of maximum of 45.5°C.

Since proclamation of South Australia in 1837 the state has experienced at least 15 earthquakes with readings of magnitude of 5 or greater. It has been established by the Seismological Committee that 81 earthquakes were noted by scanning many early newspaper articles and diaries of landowners in the 19th century is our best knowledge.

The Palmer Faultline is most westerly of a series of the north-south-trending faults with west-side up displacement. The Palmer Fault is marked by brecciated rock (meaning: break down into angular fragments) that Kanmantoo Group exposed in a disused quarry in the hanging wall of the fault at the western outskirts of Palmer.

It has been recorded that Tungkillo felt the impact of a 3.1- 3.5 magnitude earthquake on 25 February 1890. This one was claimed to be of moderate shock. Back in the early days they didn't have the equipment that they have today, so it was recorded as an estimate.

There have been other recorded earthquake shocks within the local district.

Murraylands on Wednesday 29 September 1875 near Palmer with a magnitude of 3.1 – 3.5 around 10.45 am. Mount Barker 7 July 1885 Magnitude of 4.2 at 1.38 am Epicentre. Tremors were felt as are as Tailem Bend. Nairne 8th May 1880 at 10.50 am. Woodside 2 November 1897 2.9 magnitude. Murray Bridge 28 November 1897 3.1 Magnitude about 10.30pm .

<u>Fire</u>

Tungkillo hasn't been immune to fires in the district. In the days before fire trucks residents rely on one another to tell the signs of rising smoke and raising the alarm. Willing hands-on horses and horse and buggy and any means that they could, sometimes traveling over rough terrain to the source of fire. Just before sunrise on 24 March 1869, Mary Bax began her kitchen duties at Terlinga Station when she smelt smoke. Alerting the employees, they ran down to the shearing shed, which was across the road, to find the inside was all on fire with flames going through the middle of the highest part of the roof. Penned up nearby was a mob of sheep that escaped the closed in fenced area and fled to the hills, east of tungkillo towards Rockleigh way. It took four days to retrieve all the sheep. Evidence from shepherds, other station hands and a passerby from a 2-day drinking binge in South Petherton 's District Hotel took to the local court where the jury listened for 4 hours and another 1 hour to digest. No one was charged, this finished up as just another unsolved incendiary action, the district took home consolation in the fact that the match bearer must have been an animal lover for the gate to the paddock had been opened before the flames consumed the sheep. (pg 185-186 The quiet waters by)

The Mount Barker Courier of January the 8th 1886 reported that a huge fire had devastated the Tungkillo area that burnt over the two days on 5-6 January. With stock loss, shedding, crops, haystacks, and pigs all perished. See pg 263

On January 28th, 1900, another fire engulfed the Tungkillo area this time starting at Hynes sawmill between Blumberg (Birdwood) and Mt Pleasant, At Terlinga station everything was burnt but the home was saved, the fire passed the township of Tungkillo and was heading towards Palmer. Over 12 000 acres were burnt altogether and many fences destroyed, valuable grass land was also lost. Charles Hunter was charged with lighting the fire at Mr Hynes sawmill. The defendant who is a swagman has been caution many times not to light a fire out of the river bed, but the defendant persisted and lit the fire for his cup of tea, this eventually caught on a dry log after he left it unattended, although he thought it was out when he left, strong winds fanned it into flames which spread quickly. The courts fined him 5 pounds or 3 months. Hunter was taken the Adelaide Goal.

Farmers had to contend to bushfires that were started by lighting from wild spring storm. Travelling drovers, carriers, and hawkers also caused considerable outbreaks after leaving fire campfires semi-extinguished or dropping their used lucifer matches on the ground. With harvest finished, farmers burned off the stubble, if fires were left unquenched in hollow logs this could escalated with strong winds, and many times escaping from the burn off itself. Many times, the grain stacked near homes or barns was quite often engulfed in flames and farmers losses were great.

<u>Floods</u>

South Australia has a history of floods and droughts since it was settled in 1836. Settlers had to contend with the changing flows to a river that was naturally prone to seasonal flooding. Tungkillo and the surrounding area of Tungkillo has not been immune to flooding since early times of settlement. Wild storms especially through spring were not unheard-of, washouts and the precipitation of heavy rains was not uncommon in this area, people found these trying times, but with the help of the community they soldiered through. Flooding also did serious damage to the crops and paddocks washout, posts, rails, logs and trees could be seen taken away by the flood waters and washed away.

From mid – 1866 John Hendry's foundry at Totness (now a part of Mount Pleasant) had the job of producing not only small agriculture machinery, but had the job of producing, planning, and engineering to build a bridge that crossed the Harrison Creek (between Palmer and the Tungkillo Mine in the foothills now on private land). On 16th March 1867 the Adelaide Observer (Adelaide Newspaper) reported that John Hendry's manufacture an iron bridge girder that could withstand the weight of up to 15 tons of road traffic.

During the extremely wet winter season of 1867, tragedy struck after the bridge opening for all travellers to cross over the Harrison Creek to continue towards Palmer and further afield to Mannum. Mrs Margret Walker the 3rd publican of the South Petherton District Hotel (now the retired Tungkillo Hotel) warning travellers of the hazarders conditions ahead as the water was up. Actual words found in The Quiet Waters By the Mount Pleasant District 1843-1993 By Reg Butler go as:

The bridge seems to have been constructed for fine weather and is quite inadequate to carry off the waters of a flood. It is very strongly built – two stone buttresses, with the roadway resting upon iron girders or tubes. There being no wing walls and the arches are very low, the waters made a clean sweep over the embankment, carrying everything before them and leaving a yawing chasm, into which to was more pleasant look at then to drive on a dark night. We therefore had to make a hazardous descent from this embankment and from the creek a little higher up the stream.

Later with appropriate modification, the Harrison Creek bridge set up again for business. The buttress remains downstream from the present crossing - but this project is remembered as one of the earliest known efforts of local engineers. Please remember this is now on private property and please respect the owner of this land.

Monday 7th October 1867 Adelaide Observer

2 to 3 culverts on the Mannum Road being carried away by the flood waters, causing a deviation of traffic, and stationmasters and mason are doing all they can to repair the damage. The district road -particularly that from the township to Mount Pleasant are in a very dangerous state, such flood having never been known before in the neighbourhood.

Saturday 19th August 1905 Adelaide Observer

Meeting held in the District Hotel on Saturday evening to discuss re-erecting of the bridge on Bald Hill Road which was recently destroyed by flood and the road conditions.

Friday 31 March 1922 Adelaide Observer

Government department that inspection of the Tepko to Mount Torrens Roadshows that it has been completely washed out by floods and is impossible to replace on its present alignment. It will be necessary for the council to arrange with the adjoining owners for the purchase of necessary land to construct a deviation.

Friday 7th September 1923 Adelaide Observer


The resent heavy rains were responsible for numerous complaints concerning the state of the roads around Tungkillo – Rockleigh-Mount Torrens after heavy rains.


So please don't feel isolated – no money is required to come and have a chat. Just turn up, everyone is welcome.





